This is the first issue of our bulletin and we hope it will generate some discussion and interest among our members. Our purpose is to share any interesting information relating to genealogy. We plan to vary the format from time to time to better afford a more versatile and stimulating bulletin.

Our success depends on wholehearted cooperation in the exchange of ideas and experiences.

<u>HISTORICAL NOTES</u> - Recently an acquaintance mentioned, rather shamefacedly, that he was descended from a member of the Hessian Revolutionary forces.

A little sleuthing turned up the following:

Hessians is the name given to the German soldiers who were hired by the British to fight against the American colonies during the Revolutionary War.

As more than half of then came from two Hessian provinces, the term was applied to the whole body of mercenaries, about 29,800, who had been sold into a war in which they had no interest. The men who were thus shipped to America were victims of a system which allowed European princes to sell their subjects into military service. The men were paid the usual soldier's wages, about twenty-five cents a day, the princes meanwhile pocketing a substantial bonus from the British government. Many of the Hessians settled in America after the war and became industrious and loyal citizens.

<u>RECOMMENDED TELEVISION VIEWING</u> - In a current television series, "America" Alistair Cooke gives his personal history of how the United States became the country we live in.

The series took three years to complete, taking Mr. Cooke into virtually every back corner of this nation—sampling its dialects with curiosity, its achievements with admiration and its shortcomings with compassion.

Of special interest to genealogists, "America" appears every other Tuesday evening on NBC-TV at 10:00 P.M. (Exception: .January 23rd segment will be aired at 9:00 P.M.)
