MEETING ANNOUNCEMENT: The next meeting of the Pascack Genealogy Workshop will be held on Monday, April 22, at 7:30 P.M. at the Church of Latter Day Saints, 840 Soldier Hill Road, Emerson, N.J. Mrs. Virginia Mosley, town historian of Tenafly, will be the guest speaker. Her subject will be the role of the town historian in Genealogy. Members of the Pascack Historical Society have been invited to attend this meeting.

FIELD TRIPS: With the approach of better weather, we would like to plan field trips. Places under consideration are the New Jersey Eistorical Society, Newark; the New York Public Library, and the Federal Archives Center in New York City. However, a Program Chairman and Co-Chairman are needed to make the necessary plans as well as to make meeting program plans. Any volunteers?

<u>NEW CHAIRMAN NEEDED</u>: In addition to the above, we are without a publicity chairman due to the resignation of Kathy Frasco. Kathy is tied up with other commitments. Also, "The Archivist" would like to have a reporter to interview members for the purpose of obtaining human interest stories or amusing anecdotes which have occurred in their search for ancestors.

FORMS TO BE COMPLETED: At the present we have three inquiry forms in circulation and it would be to all our advantage if these are completed and returned as soon as possible: (1) Ancestor Index Form - to be sent to Harvey Forrest. Include all allied families on which you have information as well as direct lines. (2) Inquiry form in reference to books and programs which would serve as an ordering and planning guide. (3) The enclosed form indicating areas in which you could serve. Dot Moos wishes to emphasize that frequently only a small amount of help is needed and, very often, only on certain occasions.

BOOKS: These books have been added to the Library: Gifts from Charles Gibbs-Sims--The origin and signification of Scottish surnames and Williams--Know your ancestors. From Everton-Norton--New Jersey in 1793 (Due to the destruction of the 1790 New Jersey Federal Census this is an invaluable substitute.) At our request Goodspeed has sent a new catalogue. Mrs. Ethel Zott, a new member, has submitted a list of personal holdings which she is willing to share. These will be catalogued, together with former lists we have published in "The Archivist. Our card catalogue index should be consulted in order to become familiar with material available. Books and other materials are listed according to author, title, and subject.

JEWISH IMMIGRANT ANCESTORS: For information write to: Hebrew Immigration Service, 200 Park Avenue South, New York, N.Y. POSTMASTER AIDS GENEALOGIST: In the September 1973 issue of the <u>Genea-logical Helper</u> there appeared an article by an Edna L. Wiggins, of Boys Town, Nebraska. Briefly, like all of us, she had reached an impasse in her search for ancestors in France. In desperation she tried the following: "I penned a letter addressing the envelope as follows: "To the Family of Le Duc, etc. Postmaster: For genealogical purposes I am searching for the progeny of the name Le Duc. Would you be so kind as to post this envelope on your bulletin board for two months. If, at the end of that time it has not been claimed, return to sender."" After two months of silence Mrs. Wiggins was elated to find a letter from progeny of the family of Le Duc. In this way she has successfully followed five lines, many times having only the name of a town the same as progenitors.

Not to be outdone, Ann Beck decided to try her luck following the above instructions. In January 1974 she had a letter and envelope translated into German and mailed them to two different villages in Germany. She reports:

"On February 19, 1974 I received a response from an Evangelical Minister tracing my family tree back to 1681 and 1691 and adding six additional surnames to my genealogy. The Pastor informed me that while there are no longer any persons with my family names living in his village, the letter was passed on to him and he spent many hours searching the church records for me. For payment he asked that I send \$10 worth of uncancelled U.S. stamps as he is a philatelist. His letter was most cordial and after complying with his request for stamps I am eagerly awaiting further details about my ancestors as he promised to furnish. "Indeed I am so heartened by this turn of events that I hope other Workshop members will be encouraged to do likewise. Good luck!"

<u>ANOTHER MEMBER'S SUCCESS STORY</u>: Jeff Aronsky, about whom we wrote in the last "The Archivist" writes that he continues to add to his knowledge of Aunt Sena. He has located other relatives here and they hope to have Aunt Sena visit the states soon. Relatives from Los Angeles and Cleveland would then come East to visit with her. "This whole day has been very exciting and for my encouragement I can thank the Workshop for telling me you may hit dead locks but the door will open and it DID!"

A very successful trip was made to the Short Hills Library of the Church of Latter Day Saints. Nine members, in two cars, spent the evening of June 4 investigating the resources the Library has to offer. Dorothy Brown and a volunteer worker explained the contents of the Library and the procedures for use of the card catalogue, use of the microfilm readers, and the ordering of reels of interest. A notice is sent when the microfilm arrives from Utah and it is kept for two weeks. It is, unfortunately, necessary to make a return trip to the Library to read it.

<u>PERIODICALS</u>: Ted Obal, one of our reporters, informs us that the following article of interest appeared recently: <u>Catholic Digest</u>, April 1974. "The Roots of Your Family Tree Lie Under Granite Mountain" - an article on "world's largest collection of genealogical records" in Salt Lake City.

<u>PUBLISHERS' CATALOGUES</u>: There is a folder in the library cabinet containing many catalogues and announcements. We are on the mailing list of several publishers, without cost. If, as individuals, you buy any of these books, please comment that you saw it advertised in the catalogue filed at the Pascack Genealogy Workshop.

<u>CARD CATALOGUE</u>: It might be of considerable interest to members to consult the card catalogue. This is arranged - alphabetically - according to author, title, and subject. It is divided into three areas: The Workshop's own holdings, those to be found at the nearby area libraries, and those books belonging to members who are willing to make them available subject to their own restrictions.

GENEALOGIC = GENEALOGICAL + LOGIC CENDEX = CENSUS + INDEX

An explanation of CENDEX IS ON FILE IN THE LIBRARY. A list of the material available appears in the card catalogue. The 1830 Massachusetts Census will soon be added.

IRELAND: An excellent modern map of Ireland is on file.

NEW BOOKS RECEIVED:

Johansson, Carl-Erik - <u>Cradled in Sweden</u>. This would seem to be an excellent tool. Starts with a brief study of the language - alphabet, markings, and contains a wealth of specific information.

Kirkham, E. Kay - The Handwriting of American Records for a Period of 300 Years. Fascinating and a must for those searching old documents. This would offer a wonderful project for someone with time to make a study of Handwriting and give a mini-course to other members interested. Would require study; just reading would be of no use. Any volunteers?

MARYLAND HISTORICAL SOCIETY receives several thousand requests for genealogical assistance each year. But inasmuch as it is a private organization (not a state organization) and receives no support other than dues and gifts of members, they are unable to maintain a staff large enough to render assistance to all those who request it. Genealogists with Maryland families are urged to seek help from professional researchers and to use standard reference works such as <u>Index to Source Records of Maryland</u> by Eleanor Phillips Passano; <u>Genealogical Research in Maryland: A Guide</u> by Mary K. Meyter; and <u>County Courthouses and Records of Maryland. Volume II. The Records</u> by Morris Radoff as an introduction to research in Maryland.

<u>PROBLEM CORNER</u>: This is an innovation we would like to include each issue. Perhaps you have a problem which you have been unable to solve. Send it to the Editor. It will be included in one of the future issues and, if answered, it will be printed. Here's one to start on:

Our inquirer states: "I understand that if a birth certificate is not readily accessible, one may still exist. It may mean that a <u>de-</u><u>layed</u> Birth Certificate has been filed in later years. If the date of birth is known but the date of filing is unknown, is there any way this certificate could be located?"

<u>GRAVESTONE</u> <u>RUBBINGS</u>. This is the subject of our program this month. To most of us, I think, it is an unknown art. Your editor visited the Portobello Road antique show in New York on Sunday and saw some of these. I was astounded to see how beautiful they can be. The program should be most interesting.

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OBITUARIES: The Ridgewood Library has an index of all obituaries which have appeared in the <u>New York Times</u>. The complete obituary is available on microfilm. This covers dates from 9/18/1851 to date.

LIST OF OUR HOLDINGS: It was suggested by Dick Kelting that we distribute to members a list of our holdings. Members could then at their leisure decide which might be of value to them and be ready to sign them out at the meeting. We have so little time to use the library that this might prove more convenient. The list will be distributed at the meeting. Please file and keep current as the new books are announced in The Archivist.

<u>GENEALOGY'S GROWING IMPORTANCE</u>: The increased number of articles appearing in the news media demonstrates the increased interest in genealogy. The <u>Record</u> had an article by Dr. Joyce Brothers on July 14, the <u>U.S. News and World Report</u> in the July 29 issue, and, of course, the feature article the latter part of July in the <u>Record</u>. This article was an interview with Voorhis Demarest and Dot Moos, in which Dot spoke of our Society.

The U.S. News titles its article Quest for Identity. It states that the National Archives in 1969 opened regional branches in eleven United States cities including New York. Some of our members have used this - the holdings are mostly of New York. The office is moving to Bayonne in the Fall and it is hoped will increase its materials. We are keeping in touch and will announce when the change is made. It will be much more convenient to visit at the Bayonne location.

Dr. Brothers' article includes a statement by Brian Brooks, a professional genealogist, who feels that those who trace their ancestry in hope of inheriting money or property are barking up the wrong tree. "They will probably find that their forebears are far less educated than they imagined. The fact is that most of us come from very modest backgrounds."

Three rolls of microfilm were located and the numbers given to her. She was instructed to contact a local library, a member of the inter-library loan group, and had the library send a request for the three rolls. This she did and the three rolls were forwarded to the library for her use. The Park Ridge Library was the branch used and when they notified Barbara the film was there, she picked it up. Park Ridge has no reader so Barbara went to Ridgewood where there is also a printout attachment. The film could be kept for a month, read at her convenience, and returned to the Park Ridge Library for return to Canada, all without cost to her. Wouldn't it be convenient if this service were available from all states. If anyone hears of similar cases, please let us know.

COPIER REDUCER: It was drawn to our attention that the copier at the Hillsdale Library has a reducer and works great!

<u>METHODIST RECORDS</u>: If you are searching for old Methodist records you may find them in the Rose Membrial Library at Drew University, Madison, N.J. There are thousands of uncollated documents kept by the University for the northern New Jersey Conference of the United Methodist Church.

<u>CENDEX</u>: The Cendex Division of the Genealogic Company has added the 1830 Massachusetts census record. This may be secured at a cost of \$10.00.
