1876 Walker's Bergen County Atlas Reprint

A. H. Walker's 1876 Atlas of Bergen County has been reprinted and is available for \$55 (NJ residents add 7% sales tax) plus \$5 shipping; order from Bergen Historic Books, P.O. Box 2094, Teaneck, NJ 07666-2094. This atlas contains detailed maps, showing locations of houses (most with owner's names) and buildings, county and town history, listings of government and community leaders, and names of professionals and businesses. The atlas has been reduced in size to 13-1/2" by 11" and a personal name index has been added.

Irish Genealogy Notes

GSBC Member Doris Bajak provided us with information about Clans of Ireland, which began in November 1989 with a total of 18 clans. By May 1991 94 clans (each Clan with its own contact name and telephone number) had been registered with the Clans of Ireland Office. No other Irish Mac name approaches MacCarthy in numerical strength. It is among the dozen most common names in Ireland, some 60% being found in County Cork. The sept has been described as "the most eminent by far of the noble families of the south." A brief history of the Clan name is available. Tracing Your Family's Medical Tree

One of the best presents you can give your children is a record of your family's medical tree. It should include the age at death and the cause of death (as well as other medical problems) of your parents and siblings. Data on your grandparents may be helpful, but harder to uncover. Though the science of genetics is still in its infancy, great progress has been made during the past decade concerning inheritance patterns, gene location and the capabilities of prenatal diagnosis for various genetic diseases. Possible future developments are likely to come from the massive Humane Genome Project, which will attempt to map out all human genetic material over the next 15 years. The project may enable scientists to predict certain disorders and to develop treatments; and to determine inherited traits, mental abilities, etc. (From the Sept. 1991 University of California at Berkeley *Wellness Letter* via GSBC Member Doris Bajak)

The German Connection — Dues Update

Social Security Death Index

The LDS Family History Library has recently acquired the Social Security Death Index, which is now available at the main library and any Family History Center that offers a compact disc program.

The Social Security Index lists 39.5 million deceased people who had social security numbers and whose deaths occurred between 1962 and the end of 1988. These records include date of birth as reported to Social Security; social security number and the state that issued the number; month and year of death; state in which deceased resided at death; state and zip code for place of death and places where death benefits were sent. This information will help in obtaining death certificates and social security applications.

Photocopies of original Social Security applications will show the address of the applicant, date and place of birth, father's name, and mother's maiden name. They are available for \$7 from Social Security Administration, 4H8 Annex, 6401 Security Boulevard, Baltimore, MD 21235.

Social Security Records Threatened

A GSBC member from California has alerted us that the Social Security Administration plans to destroy the original 37 million

Martha Ann Zabriskie's Memorandum Book

Martha Ann Zabriskie (1814-1838), of Saddle River, N. J. (da. of Garrot A. L. Zabriskie and Catherine Westervelt) kept this diary of local events from 1829 until her death, after which her sister, Adaline (who m. in 1855, George Ealer) continued it until 1849.

The diary is a running account of mostly local births, deaths, and marriages, with an occasional reference to (usually extreme) weather, unusual local happenings, and national or worldwide events.

The following transcription was made by Pat Wardell from a typescript transcription of the diary (a copy of which is on deposit with the Bergen County Historical Society).

Some (but not all) of the remarks in parentheses probably were interpolated by the person who made the typewritten transcript. Bracketed comments have been interpolated by this editor.

Events listed should be used with care, as clues, and verified wherever possible by church or other records. It is this editor's experience that while some dates are correct as compared with church records, other dates are off by a few days (perhaps the listing reflects the date of entry in the memorandum book).

Smeltzer Notes

Mrs. M. Smeltzer Stevenot sent us some Smeltzer information after corresponding with Philip O'Leary III concerning #00087 Elizabeth Smeltzer (1824-1881) of York Co., PA, listed in Mr. O'Leary's ancestor table published in the Nov 1991 *Archivist*. She wrote to O'Leary in Nov. 1991: .

"The name [Elizabeth Smeltzer] intrigues me since I have published two books on the Irish Smeltzers: The Smeltzers of Kilcooly (1981) and Irish Palatine Smeltzers Around the World (1987). The Irish clans were part of the 1709 mass migration from the Rhineland; Smeltzers were among those relocated in southern Ireland.

There were also Smeltzers (Schmeltzer, Smelser) who emigrated directly from Germany. Half a dozen came through the port of Philadelphia before the Revolution—settled first in Pennsylvania; then many moved west and south. Others have followed these lines—I have not.

Since O'Leary was born in Ireland, I am wondering whether Elizabeth Smeltzer was Palatine Irish or German. The first Irish Smeltzer settled in upper NY State in 1819. Most others went to Ontario about 1830—New York mid 19th century.

In 1715 Peter Smelser and Christopher (an older man) were on the roll of Palatines. It appears to me that Christopher returned to the continent and that the remaining Smeltzers were all descended from Peter. One branch stayed in Limerick, another went to Co. Tipperary."

In a follow-up letter to O'Leary in January 1992, thanking him for additional data, she added the following information:

"The immigrant ancestor was Johannes Schmeltzer who arrived 25 Sept 1732 on the *Royal (Loyal?) Judith*, Robert Turpin, master, at Philadelphia from Rotterdam and Plymouth. He was age 26. Johannes was born in Carlsruhe, Baden, married Elizabeth Korr (Kurr) in PA in 1735. They had 7 children. She was the daughter of Michael Kurr and Elizabeth.

A descendant of John Peter, their son, is Mrs. Cleo Bailey, Box 185, Forsan, TX 79733. He died in Greene Co., Tenn. There is supposed to be a will.

Another source might be Passenger & Immigration Lists, Ed. P. William Filby & Mary K. Meyer.

The guardianship case of the children is described in "The Northern Kraichgau" by Annette K. Burget, PA Gen. Soc., Breinigsville, PA, Vol. 1, 1983 (?).

Johannes' wife Elizabeth was the daughter of Michael Korr who arrived in PA in 1728 from Ehrstadt in the Northern Kraichgau. Orphan's Court Docket 8 Nov 1754, Peter, John and Elizabeth (over 14) chose their father as guardian as heirs of Michael's estate. Those under 14, Margaret, Sabina, Jacobina and Jacob by the court.

Recently I found the marriage of Sabina in Palatines of New York State (1990) by Hank Jones Jr." ■

Burials in the Paramus Plains Cemetery

(We thank Patti Boyle for passing along to us the copy of the legal document on which this listing is based, which was presented to her by Daniel Burrows of the Orange County Genealogical Society.)

In 1948 the Board of Education of the Township of Ridgewood applied to the Superior Court of New Jersey, Law Division, Bergen County (Docket #L-1100-48) "for permission to take possession of the Paramus Plains Cemetery and to remove bodies." This cemetery was located in the Village of Ridgewood, on the easterly side of South Pleasant Avenue approx. 200 feet south of the southerly side line of East Ridgewood Ave., and was designated as Lot 10 in Block 383 on the 1940 Assessment Atlas of the Village of Ridgewood (filed in Bergen County Clerk's office as Map #63). The cemetery was also designated as the Paramus Plains Cemetery by a map filed in the Bergen County Clerk's Office on June 29, 1895, as Map #733.

On 20 September 1948 the Board of Health of the Village of Ridgewood and the Board of Commissioners of the Village of Ridgewood determined that the cemetery was a detriment to the public health and a public nuisance and that the land should be converted to public use. On 11 October 1948 The Board of Education determined that the cemetery property was suitable for its school expansion program and authorized its acquisition.

The First Presbyterian Church of Ridgewood, the owner of the cemetery, was willing to convey the property, but since plots had been conveyed to private persons, plot owners or their next of kin had to be located and notified. Disinterred remains were to be reinterred in George Washington Memorial Park at Paramus, NJ.

William E. Reinhardt, Attorney for the Board of Education of the Township of Ridgewood, listed in "Schedule A," recorded plot owners, burials, approximate dates of burials, and names and addresses of relatives of plot owners. His list, dated 1948, follows.

Martha Ann Zabriskie's Memorandum Book

Martha Ann Zabriskie (1814-1838), of Saddle River, N. J. (dau. of Garret A. L. Zabriskie and Catherine Westervelt) kept this diary of local events from 1829 until her death, after which her sister, Adaline (who m. in 1855, George Esler) continued it until 1849.

The diary is a running account of mostly local births, deaths, and marriages, with an occasional reference to (usually extreme) weather, unusual local happenings, and national or worldwide events.

The following transcription was made by Pat Wardell from a typescript transcription of the diary (a copy of which is on deposit with the Bergen County Historical Society).

Some (but not all) of the remarks in parentheses probably were interpolated by the person who made the typewritten transcript. Bracketed comments have been interpolated by this editor.

Events listed should be used with care, as clues, and verified wherever possible by church or other records. It is this editor's experience that while some dates are correct as compared with church records, other dates are off by a few days (perhaps the listing reflects the date of entry in the memorandum book).

"Shadyside" in Edgewater

Shadyside, is a new book recently written and published by Mike Kruglinski. Mike, who now lives in Englewood, grew up in this tiny "neighborhood" that was once a part of Bergen County. It lies on the Hudson River just below North Hudson Park (No. Bergen, Hudson Co.). It's perhaps best known as the site of Unilever (Lever Brothers) Laboratories, where Mike once worked. The tiny village of "Shady Side" (considered a part of Edgewater) is immediately north of the old "Bull's Ferry," and is illustrated in A. H. Walker's 1876 *Atlas of Bergen County*, on page 162.

Shadyside is best described as the author's personal memoir and history of the community in which he was raised and lived from 1921 until 1941. There is a limited amount of genealogical information, mostly concerning the Kruglinski family and a few others who once lived there. It provides an important addition to the fine collection of local histories that have been written about the many communities in Bergen County.

Robert D. Griffin, GSBC member and owner and publisher of Bergen Historic Books, has presented the Society with a copy of *Shadyside*.

1859-1894, now available on microfilm at the Municipal Archives of the City of New York.

These records, required by the NYC Board of Health, tracked any body arriving in Manhattan, to aid in the prevention of communicable diseases. Any bodies shipped back to, or through NYC, for burial, were duly registered. The information included the Date of Passage through New York, Name, Age, Nativity, Place of Death, Date of Death, Disease, Place of Interment, and the Name and Address of the Person Having Charge of the Body.

Alexander Library at Rutgers Closed til October

Because of expansion and renovation of the Alexander Library at Rutgers University, its College Avenue campus reading room closed May 2 and will remain closed until October. Full service is expected to resume in Alexander Library about October 5, 1992.

The New Jersey Collection only is available in the Library Annex Building on Busch Campus through August 28, from 9 am to 4 pm. For additional or updated information, or directions to the Annex, call Special Collections at (908) 932-7510.

NJ Vital Statistics Freeze

A request for a death certificate resulted in a response from the New Jersey Bureau of Vital Statistics that the Bureau has been experiencing an employment freeze and budget restrictions, so all processing of genealogical requests has been suspended indefinitely. The Bureau also advised that the New Jersey State Archives have the original vital records for May 1848 to May 1878. The Archives continues to search these records by mail for a fee of \$4.00 per record. The Archives has also begun to acquire the following vital records on microfilm: marriage records, June 1878 to 1940; death records, June 1878 to 1940; and birth records, June 1878 to 1923. These microfilmed records are open for research at the Archives Tuesday through Friday, 8:30 to 4:30. The Archives, however, cannot search microfilmed records by mail.

Worldwide Mary and John Conference, 1993 in CT

Because in the past decade there has been an information and interest explosion about the 1630 "Mary and John" families, a special worldwide conference is planned for 22-24 September 1993, in Windsor CT and will feature experts on both sides of the Atlantic. Each county has four indexes—alphabetically by first name, then chronologically by date, and also alphabetically by surname and date.

From Bob Hubbard, Hillsdale, NJ:

I have a correction to make to Martha Ann Zabriskie's Memorandum Book. Listed on May 2, 1837 is as follows: "Abraham Tice drowned."

He was Abraham Tyson. His widow, Emeline Tyson, is listed Nov. 6, 1837 as: "Married David Johnson to widow Tice." It should read "widow Tyson." I had been searching for the second husband for some time and was taken by surprise when I came across the entry Abraham Tice drowned May 2, 1837. I knew he drowned before September 1837 and figured this was the fellow I was looking for. I looked up David Johnson and family in later censuses to see if his wife was named Emeline, and sure enough, she was.

Emeline Tyson Johnson's maiden name was Johnson also, and David may well have been a cousin. They had four children, a girl and three boys, and lived in Ramapo, Rockland County, NY.

Emeline and Abraham Tyson had four boys, of whom I know the names of the two youngest—

(1) William Perry Tyson, 1832-1917, who was the first Mayor of Bergenfield, NJ 1894-96, and who was a large landowner and benefactor of that community (donated land where Franklin School is now and helped bring the railroad through that area); and

(2) Abraham H. Tyson, 1837-1933.

Both sons were mason contractors, mainly in NYC.

Martha Ann Zabriskie's Memorandum Book

Martha Ann Zabriskie (1814-1838), of Saddle River, N. J. (da. of Garret A. L. Zabriskie and Catherine Westervelt) kept this diary of local events from 1829 until her death, after which her sister, Adaline (who m. in 1855, George Ealer) continued it until 1849.

The diary is a running account of mostly local births, deaths, and marriages, with an occasional reference to (usually extreme) weather, unusual local happenings, and national or worldwide events.

The following transcription was made by Pat Wardell from a typescript transcription of the diary (a copy of which is on deposit with the Bergen County Historical Society).

Some (but not all) of the remarks in parentheses probably were interpolated by the person who made the typewritten transcript. Bracketed comments have been interpolated by this editor.

Events listed should be used with care, as clues, and verified wherever possible by church or other records. It is this editor's experience that while some dates are correct as compared with church records, other dates are off by a few days (perhaps the listing reflects the date of entry in the memorandum book).

How to Prepare for a Family History Center Visit

FHCs or Family History Centers are branches of the Salt Lake City Family History Library run by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and open free to the public. They operate on a nonprofit basis. As a branch, they have a copy of the entire index to Salt Lake's Library. You can look through the index of world-wide records and pick which ones you'd like to view, then order them for a small fee of about \$3 each. They take anywhere from 2-6 weeks to arrive at the FHC and you have 3 weeks to examine them there. Much information is on hand and doesn't require an order to access. You do not need to be an expert or professional to use the FHC. Volunteer staff members are willing to help a beginning researcher. These volunteers are not professional genealogists themselves. Think of them as librarians. They may be new at this and are learning as they go, too. A librarian will not do research for you, but can point you to the proper reference books and indexes to help you do your own research (just like a regular public library).

Video tapes and brochures can be viewed and read at the FHC for further help. (I learned how to do research by just walking in one day. I had no prior experience—I went to the information desk, explained that I wanted to do genealogy and they told me how to go about it. Every time I came to something new, I went to the help desk and asked a question. Learn by doing a little bit at a time. Don't hesitate to ask questions.)

The best way to prepare is to gather what genealogical information you have. Go through it and fill out pedigree charts and family group sheets as completely as you can with the information you have. You could also enter the names in a genealogy computer program such as PAF (Personal Ancestral File) and print out the sheets. If you don't know how to fill out a sheet or where to buy some, go to the FHC and ask. (They sell these sheets and can show you how to use them.) Then, if you have cooperative relatives, ask them for more information. If they can add to what you already know, it will save many hours of looking for the information elsewhere.

When you go to the FHC, be sure to bring plenty of paper to take notes on. ALWAYS write down the sources you've looking in—even if you found nothing in them—or you will find yourself needlessly repeating the same research eventually. If you plan to use the FHC's CD-ROM computer, it would be helpful to bring a blank, formatted disk. The 386sx computer has 2 disk drives—the larger 5-1/4" is 1.2 meg and the smaller 3-1/2" is 1.4 meg in size. Selected information found on the computer can be copied to your disk for free or printed out for 5 cents a page. Some FHC information is only found on the computer.

Now you are ready to go to the FHC! Show a staff member your pedigree chart and pick one ancestor you want to start looking for (but please spare them the long monologues of your history—they are busy folks). The staff will teach you how to use the files and help you learn how to do research by yourself. They will train you on computer usage. Happy hunting!

They also have an office at 608 5th Avenue, New York, NY 10020 (1-212-977-2700). Call Ruesch and they will provide the current exchange rate and a quote of the precise amount needed in dollars. You then send a check in that amount plus a small service charge and in return Ruesch mails you a check payable in the correct currency and amount, made payable to the person you designated (this must be advised to them in your covering letter). Banks usually charge \$15 or more for a check in foreign currency.

According to the Winter 1992 Family History Library News, the LDS Family History Library has a significant new microfilm collec-

tion of 24 million cards created during the World War I draft. There were three draft registrations which eventually included all men (whether native born or alien) between the ages of 18 and 45. The information on the cards includes:

- Full Name
- Full date and place of birth
- Race, citizenship, and occupation
- Personal description and signature

Registration cards exist for about 24.2 million men who registered for the draft. Not all of the men who registered actually served in the military; not all men who served in the military registered for the draft. The draft cards are NOT military service records. They have no information about a person's military service. About 4.8 million men actually served in the United States armed forces between April 1917 and November 1918.

The draft cards are arranged by state, then county or city (except for Connecticut, Massachusetts and Rhode Island, which are arranged by divisions and counties); then alphabetically by the names of the registrants.

The states Alabama through North Carolina are currently available at the Family History Library. The rest will be available when they have been catalogued. To find the microfilm numbers, search the locality section of the FHLC (Family History Library Catalog) under United States — Military Records — World War, 1914-1918.

To obtain microfilm numbers for states not yet listed in the catalog write to the Correspondence Unit, 35 North Temple Street, Family History Library, Salt Lake City, UT 84150.

Some World War I service and burial records are available from the Family History Library. Look in the locality section of the catalog under [STATE] — Military Records. Official World War I military service records can also be requested by next of kin and others with stated needs. Make requests to the National Personnel Records Center, 9700 Page Blvd., St. Louis, MO 63132-5100.

...[regarding French Huguenot settlers of New Rochelle, New York] "...On 6 Feb 1695, letters of denization were given by the Province of New York to 30 such Huguenots. Such a letter served as a sort of passport for stateless persons, in both civil and religious matters. Recipients included one, Ambroise Sicard, Sr., and his sons, Ambroise, Jr., Daniel, and Jacques Sicard. Cultivation of their lots began immediately, in the hope of paying off the mortgages as soon as possible. In 1699, Ambroise Sicard was named Collector.

"In early records, the French name sounded in

Dutch like, and was sometimes "Dutchicized" to ZIKA (pronounced "Zeekah") or LIKA, and it later became SECORD. ...

Ambroise Sicard, Sr., born est. 1630, in La Rochelle, France, fled from France in 1681. He may have gone to the West Indies, where his eldest son, Abroise, Jr. is known to have been. Sr. is known to have been in the Western Division, New Rochelle, prior to 1692. On 6 Feb 1696, Sr. received a Letter of Denization with the three sons shown below, and his son-in-law, Guillaume (William) Landrin. Sr. paid off his mortgage, and was a freeholder in 1708. In the 1698 census of New Rochelle, he is shown as age 67, without a wife, and living with his son, Daniel. His wife's name has not been found; she may have died before the immigration. His will is recorded New Rochelle, NY, 21 May 1701.

A Brief History of the Genealogical Society of Bergen County, NJ

In January 1971, a group of people who had taken an adult education course in genealogy at Pascack Hills High School in Montvale, NJ (Charles Gibbs, instructor), decided to continue to meet informally on every fourth Monday of the month at the Westwood Public Library. They called themselves the Pascack Genealogy Workshop. Marge Johnston was the leader and acted as Secretary.

By the fall of 1972, Marge was unable to continue, but ten of the people still wished to meet. They decided to form a formal organization with officers, by-laws and new members. Present, at a special organizational meeting, were eight people. It was decided to retain the name of Pascack Genealogy Workshop. The dues were set at \$5.00 initiation fee, plus \$3.00 annual membership. Officers were elected, and the Secretary, Dot Moos, mailed "an invitation to join" to all who had taken Charles Gibbs' course. Notices were placed in local libraries, super-markets, newspapers, etc.

At 7:30 on January 22, 1973 the first official meeting of the Workshop was held at the Westwood Public Library. Those who officially joined at that meeting and became Charter Members were: Anne Angeloni, Vice-President; Ann Beck, Editor of the Archivist; Edna Falter, Librarian; Julie Fetters, Harvey Forrest, Kathy Frasco, Charles Gibbs (Honorary Member), Jeanne Hogan, Marge Johnston, Dot Moos, Secretary; Gardner Moyer, Treasurer; Spence Newman, President; Ted Obal, and Evelyn Peterson. There were 14 members in all. The first edition of the Archivist, a one page bulletin, was distributed at the meeting by Ann Beck.

By April, others had joined, making a total of 20 members. A committee was formed to draft by-laws, and this was completed by the end of the summer.

In September, since the Workshop had only one drawer of a file cabinet in which to house its books at the Westwood Library, it moved to the Church of Latter Day Saints in Emerson, NJ.

Edna Falter became Editor of the Archivist in 1974. Ted Obal and Jeff Aronsky were on the editorial staff. The newsletter was now distributed by mail instead of being handed out at the meetings.

Anne Angeloni, Membership Chairman, completed and distributed a membership list consisting of 33 names.

Since the interests of the group were widened, and it became more than a Workshop, it was decided to change the name to the Pascack Genealogy Society.

In 1975, an Adult Genealogy Course was offered by the Society at the Benjamin Franklin Junior High School in Ridgewood, NJ. The members who volunteered to teach the class were: Charles Gibbs, Dot Moos, Spence Newman, Ted Obal and John

Svenson. The school received one-half of the fee paid by the students, and the other half was deposited in the Treasury of the Society.

Lola Crandall became Librarian in 1978, taking care of the collection of books for use by the members. Ted Obal was now Editor of the Archivist.

The name of the organization was changed to the Bergen County Genealogy Society in 1979. Membership cards were purchased in 1980 and used when dues were paid. Name tags were made available to be picked up upon entering the meetings and returned before leaving.

In 1981, the Church of Latter Day Saints informed the Society that the Church needed more room for their own affairs, and it was necessary to look elsewhere for a meeting place. The Hillsdale Public Library agreed that the Society could meet there and retain a small library. An Ancestor Surname Card File was compiled to be kept at the Library.

In June of that year the name was changed once again to the Genealogical Society of Bergen County, N.J.

In 1982, the responsibility of the adult course offered by the Society was taken over by Maria Hopper.

Annabelle Courtney, now Membership Chairman, reported in 1983 that the Society had 147 members, including 23 from out-of-state and one from Canada. Dues were changed to \$5.00 for individuals and \$8.00 for families. Ted Obal's Editorial staff consisted of Barbara and George Crede and Maria Hopper.

Another change as to where the Society would meet took place in 1987. Through the efforts of Barbara Flurchick, the Midland Park Public Library was acquired, and trial meetings were held there in September and October. Regular meetings are held there to the present time.

A revised set of By-laws was adopted on June 27, 1988. With the new By-Laws, the Society was pursuing a Certificate of Incorporation and a New Jersey non-profit status with Federal and State exemptions. In accordance with these new By-Laws, a new Board of Trustees, consisting of 5 officers and 4 at-large trustees, was elected in January 1989.

Ken and Edna Franz co-ordinated the teaching of the genealogy course and added a new Family History study to the Adult Education program in Ridgewood. Several members of the Society were part of the teaching team.

The November 1989 meeting started at a new time — 7:00 P.M. instead of 7:30 P.M. Dues were now set at \$12 for individuals and \$14.00 for families. Out-of-Country members would pay \$15.00.

In January of 1990, two of the members who had put forth much time and effort, withdrew from their positions. Lola Crandall, who had taken care of the library for 12 years, handed over the duties of Librarian to Marion Armstrong; and Ted Obal, after 16 years of working on the Archivist, retired and Pat Wardell succeeded him.

In June of 1990, Patricia Boyle, Membership Chairman, reported the Society had 170 paid members and 23 complimentary. Today, 1992, finds that three of the fourteen Charter Members are paid-up to date. They are: Anne Angeloni, Dot Moos and Ted Obal. Dot and Ted attend meetings regularly.

The Workshop has come a long way since its inception and has shown a significant growth with a substantial increase in membership. As of August 1992 there were 165 members — 128 individual, 17 family, and 20 complimentary.

The purpose of the organization is to bring together people who are interested in genealogy, to exchange information and experiences, and to encourage the preservation of their family history.

Meetings are held the fourth Monday at 7:00 P.M. at the Midland Park Library. At these meetings, there is a short business portion followed by a program with a speaker, a discussion group, or an informal question and answer period. Among the activities are planned field trips for the purpose of gathering material to further the members' genealogies. Membership is open to anyone interested in learning more about their own family history through genealogy and a desire to keep searching for the past which we all represent.

Jan. 22, 1993 will be the 20th Anniversary of the organization. Many members have contributed a great deal to help the Society grow, and I am certain everyone would agree that it was well worth while.

We received the following from Maria Pratt Hopper re: Paramus Plains Cemetery.

"...Thought you'd like to know that the tombstones in "Paramus Plains Cemetery" have been copied by Ackerman & Goff. They are copied under the title "True Reformed Church of Paramus Cemetery."

My husband's aunt, Mrs. John Macfarlan (Ruth Hopper) (see pg. 7 Aug, plot 26 & 27) told me the cemetery was "demolished" for the building of a school. She stated that they were told the bodies would be reinterred at George Washington Memorial Park unless the family requested otherwise. She requested Valleau and they granted her request."

Maria goes on to say that the Ackerman & Goff gravestone inscriptions add a lot more information to that given in this list, and that if you find an ancestor here, you might like to check Ackerman & Goff's listing as well. She notes, incidentally, that Ackerman & Goff had totally different plots and numbers.

Martha Ann Zabriskie's Memorandum Book

Martha Ann Zabriskie (1814-1838), of Saddle River, N. J. (dau. of Garret A. L. Zabriskie and Catherine Westervelt) kept this diary of local events from 1829 until her death, after which her sister, Adaline (who m. in 1855, George Esler) continued it until 1849.

The diary is a running account of mostly local births, deaths, and marriages, with an occasional reference to (usually extreme) weather, unusual local happenings, and national or worldwide events.

The following transcription was made by Pat Wardell from a typescript transcription of the diary (a copy of which is on deposit with the Bergen County Historical Society).

Some (but not all) of the remarks in parentheses probably were interpolated by the person who made the typewritten transcript. Bracketed comments have been interpolated by this editor.

Events listed should be used with care, as clues, and verified wherever possible by church or other records. It is this editor's experience that while some dates are correct as compared with church records, other dates are off by a few days (perhaps the listing reflects the date of entry in the memorandum book).

What's In a Family History Center?

Family History Centers (or FHCs) are branches of the Salt Lake City, Utah, Family History Library. They can be found all over the world and are located near or inside buildings of the "Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints." FHCs are open free to the public and run on a nonprofit basis.

To find one near you, look in your local phonebook for a church and call. Size and hours of each FHC vary. Since they are branches of Salt Lake's Family History (Genealogy) Library, they have the index to all genealogical items there. That index is called the "FHLC" or Family History Library Catalog. It contains 2 main sections.

The first section consists of authors, surnames and subjects of genealogy books. You could look up an ancestor's last name and see if a book had been written about his family and donated to the library. You could also look up a subject such as "Mayflower Descendants."

The second section of the FHLC is the Locality Catalog. All kinds of records with genealogical value have been microfilmed. For instance, in any FHC you could look up Virginia in the Locality Catalog and see what kinds of records have been microfilmed from there. Records such as birth, marriage, church, probate, land, military and more would be listed.

You do not have to be in that state to see those records since they can be ordered from Salt Lake to view for a small shipping and handling fee of about \$3. They will be kept at the local FHC for about 3 weeks (longer times are available) for you to come and view them on microfilm.

Other countries that have let the LDS church come in and microfilm are accessible just as easily. You could look up German, English, Canadian, etc. records. The FHLC is on microfiche and also CD-ROMs for FHCs equipped with computers.

Another useful file is the IGI (International Genealogical Index). This consists solely of names. You could look up an ancestor's name and see if it had been previously researched and submitted to us. If you find

the name listed, you could save hours of research. Along with that name will be birth or marriage information and a place that event took place. This file is also available on microfiche or CD-ROMs.

A new CD-ROM search can be done from the Military Death Index. This government file lists people who died either in the Korean or Vietnam Wars. If you find a name here, you can get a little more information about them.

Depending on size, other indexes can also be used as you look for your ancestors. The "Family Registry" can be very helpful. This fiche file, soon to become part of the "Ancestral File on CD," consists of names people are working on and a registry of family organizations.

For example, if you wish to have contact with all the people named "Smith," you could start a family organization and advertise it for free here. If you are looking for a specific person such as John Smith, born in Australia in 1875, you could also register him. Contributions to this file are free. (I found four relatives myself here!!!) Other people will then see the name you are working on and have your address.

Another microfiche file found in many FHCs is the AIS (Accelerated Indexing Systems). This is a census index for the United States. If you have an ancestor who you know lived in the U.S., but you have no idea what state, looking in this microfiche file could help. If you find his name, you will get a census place, year, and even page number. The census film could then be ordered from the FHC, if desired. The AIS is particularly useful for finding people who lived in the mid-1800s, but census years from 1906 (and some mortality schedules) and earlier are listed.

If the FHC is equipped with a CD-ROM computer, more files can be searched. (Some indexes discussed here are available only on microfiche, some only on CD-ROMs and some on both.)

One CD-ROM-only file is the "Social Security Death Index," a public domain file from the U.S. Government. If a person died between 1937 and 1988 and had a Social Security number (and his death was reported to the S.S. office), you could look him up here. You don't need to know the SS number, only a name or part of a name.

Another large CD-ROM file is the "Ancestral File on CD." This consists of pedigree charts and group sheets on 9.6 million names. If your ancestor is here, you can get descendants' addresses and their pedigree chart. Keep in mind that this is only an "opinion" file. These charts were donated by others — they are only as accurate as the submitters wrote them. A new feature has been added where you can submit corrections to this index which then appear on a future update.

Don't forget to check the FHC reference book. Of special use are the "Research Guides." If, for example, you are researching names in Kentucky, you could read the Research Guide for Kentucky. It will tell you about what kind of records were kept there, names and addresses of genealogical societies there and MORE! Don't overlook these valuable booklets. Other books may be on hand such as the "Handybook for Genealogists" or "The Source." ■
