### Genealogical Info from Passport Applications

According to an article in the Winter 1993 quarterly of the National Archives, *Prologue*, applications for passports, especially those of foreign-born ancestors, can be an excellent source of genealogical information. Applications from Oct 1795 through March 1925 are at the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA), and those from April 1925 to the present are in the custody of the U.S. Dept. of State. There are four major types of passports: regular, emergency, special, and insular. Applications for regular passports generally include the applicant's name, date and place of birth, and physical description. Some give the applicant's occupation, foreign destination, and reason for foreign travel. For naturalized citizens, the applications may state the court and date of naturalization as well as the date an ship on which the applicant immigrated to the U.S. Photographs have been required with applications since 21 Dec 1914. Indexes and chronological registers for some years can be found on National Archives Microfilm Publication M1371. Written requests for copies of passport records from 1795 to 1905 should be addressed to: General Reference Branch (NNRG), National Archives and Records Administration, Washington, DC 10408.

The entire article, "Passport Applications: A Key to Discovering Your Immigrant Ancestor's Roots" by Kathie O. Nicastro and Claire Prechtel-Kluskens, is in the Winter 1993 *Prologue*, which is kept in the open bookcases in our Society's library.

◆ To Query No. 74, Nov 1993 *Archivist*, from Garry Brickman, 67 Coleridge Park Dr., Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada R3B 0B3 —

THE ROBLIN FAMILY — Pride of Place, A Story of the Settlement of Prince Edward County, p. 99 contains a reference to a Roblin family said to have come to Ontario from Orange County.

I am interested in any answers you receive because in my research of the Brickman family I found the following reference in an article on early pioneers of Prince Edward County that appeared in the Picton Times (a newspaper in the County) many years ago:

"They left the Palatinate on the Rhine in 1668, and along with them were the Redners, the Weeses, the Brickmans, the Roblins, the Freleights and a host of other families seeking an asylum in the new world. If ever a people needed sympathy and protection it was these poor, oppressed people."

The Brickmans (Brueckman) and Redners (Ridenour) came from Bergen County, New Jersey. I suspect the Roblins did also.

The Roblins were a well known family in Prince Edward County and their descendants who came West to Manitoba produced two Premiers of this Province. Could these be the same Roblins you are researching?

◆ To Query No. 76, Nov 1993 *Archivist*, from Tom Wicks, GSBC member —

DEMAREST, NJ CEMETERY — In Nov 1993 Tom Wicks and his wife visited the cemetery described in the query and found it to be the "Sautjes Taves Begraven Ground," with a plaque at the pre-revolutionary cemetery placed by the David Demarest Chapter, DAR, May 30, 1957. Tom wrote to Lorraine V. Johansen (the querist): "... The cemetery is lined with fir trees on all sides. These

add to the dignity of preservation. It looks as though it is maintained, grass cut, and leaves taken up. However, there is a moderate amount of damage and many stones are broken in half. One monument with an obelisk was toppled. A few of the stones which are left need immediate restoration. I made a quick approximation and think there are about 50 stones still visible. Many of them are no longer readable. A few of the names were: Parsells, Ackerman, Sleight, Haring, and Blackledge. . . . Tom also sent along a map, showing the location of the cemetery.

Mrs. Johansen promptly replied to Tom: "You can't imagine how delighted I was to learn that 'my' cemetery is not only still there, but being cared for. . . . Having spent 20+ years of my life in Demarest, it's an important part of my past and a time when I thought the area was THE most perfect place on earth. It had four seasons to be enjoyed every year. It was rural (not yet suburban) but within commuting distance of 'the greatest city on earth.' What more could one want? We rode the 'Weary Erie' railroad, and later the Public Service bus, to high school in Tenafly. . . Thank you from my heart for doing this for me."

### GUIDELINES FOR SUBMITTING QUERIES

We have had a number of recent requests for rules and guidelines for submitting queries for *The Archivist*. We have no formal rules except that only GSBC members may submit queries. As to guidelines, we have no hard and fast rules, and suggest that query writers scan previous printed queries for ideas for form, etc. A few general suggestions:

1. Be brief and concise, but give as much clearly written information as possible to help identify an individual (dates, places, relatives, etc.).
2. To avoid confusion, limit queries to one or two requests about the same individual or family. If you need information about more than one individual or family, write separate, additional queries.
3. Use common, clear abbreviations. If you're not sure of an abbreviation, use the complete word or term to avoid misunderstanding.

We welcome your queries and are happy to print them as space permits. ■

### First Families of Tennessee Program

In honor of Tennessee's Bicentennial in 1996, the East Tennessee Historical Society is sponsoring a new heritage program titled "First Families of Tennessee," to identify and recognize all descendants of the first residents of the state of Tennessee. Anyone who is directly descended from a person living in Tennessee when — or before — the state was admitted to the Union in 1796 is eligible for membership. ### Finding Civil War Ancestors Made Easier

Volunteers across the country are entering approximately 3.5 million names into the Civil War Soldiers System (CWSS), a computerized database sponsored by the National Park System service and Civil War Trust with the assistance of the National Archives, Federation of Genealogical Societies, and Genealogical Society of Utah. The database, which should be available for public use in 1996, is drawn from microfilm copies of 5.4 million original handwritten records. Besides the individuals' names, the CWSS Names Index will list their Confederate or Union service, regiment, and rank.

In addition, the database will identify the location of soldiers buried in cemeteries managed by the Park Service. Although the finished product will initially be usable only in major Park Service-managed Civil War sites, it may later become available to libraries and other resource locations. ### Update on Gethsemane Cemetery

According to an article in *The Record* 10 Nov 1993, the one-acre Gethsemane Cemetery in Little Ferry, NJ, once in disrepair, with scattered and toppled headstones surrounded by rubbish and weeds, is on the way to being added to the state and national registers. The Sand Hill, or the Hackensack Colored Cemetery, as it was also known, began in the 1860s. In 1901 the property passed into the hands of a newly incorporated group known as the Gethsemane Cemetery Association. Burials there ended in the 1920s and in the ensuing years the cemetery was neglected. Grave markers in the cemetery have been restored, and studies have revealed the names of the deceased — most of them African-American — along with their birth dates, causes of death, and even occupations. Other significant artifacts have also been found by geologists and stone conservators working to restore and document the location: typical "grave goods" such as warm-water mollusk shells, sheaves of wheat, and clay pipes, which have also been discovered at other African-American gravesites. ■

### Carpenter Family Bible Records

The Genealogical Society of Bergen County has had in its collection for many years, a Bible containing information about a Carpenter family. We don't know at this time how we got the Bible. The records in it might pertain to a family with Connecticut origins or connections.

Included in the Bible were newspaper clippings: two concerning the First Congregational Church of Marshalltown; and another, an obituary notice of Dea. Dyer Carpenter, who d. in Gerry, May 31st, aged 75 years; he was born in Eastford, Connecticut. Also included was a letter written on the letterhead of an Agency of Niagara Fire Insurance Company of New York, and pen dated Jamestown, January 30th, 1874 to A. C. Carpenter with the salutation "Dear Uncle" and signed Otis.

Also included were two marriage certificates for the same marriage: Mr. Henry Heins of New York City, NY and Mrs. Augusta Carpenter of Baltimore, Maryland were united in marriage. . . [in the] State of New York at Ridgewood, L.I. on 28 April 1914 by Rev. J. Henry Stelljes; witnessed by Mrs. Ida M. Stelljes.

Marion Armstrong, our librarian, has sent photocopies of the records in the Bible to the D.A.R., the Family History Library, and the Connecticut Genealogical Society.

Two penned inscriptions on a blank page in the Bible are:

Did your ancestor disappear in the 1850s? Try looking in the 1850 California State Census. Over 50,000 people traveled overland or aboard ship to the California gold fields. The 1852 State Census of California is especially valuable as it asked for each person's residence and most answered with the name of the state from which they came. By 1855, 23,000 of these people had moved or returned to their former homes.

## Martha Ann Zabriskie's Memorandum Book

Martha Ann Zabriskie (1814-1838), of Saddle River, N. J. (dau. of Garret A. L. Zabriskie and Catherine Westervelt) kept this diary of local events from 1829 until her death, after which her sister, Adaline (who m. in 1855, George Esler) continued it until 1849.

The diary is a running account of mostly local births, deaths, and marriages, with an occasional reference to (usually extreme) weather, unusual local happenings, and national or worldwide events.

The following transcription was made by Pat Wardell from a typescript transcription of the diary (a copy of which is on deposit with the Bergen County Historical Society).

Some (but not all) of the remarks in parentheses probably were interpolated by the person who made the typewritten transcript. Bracketed comments have been interpolated by this editor.

Events listed should be used with care, as clues, and verified wherever possible by church or other records. It is this editor's experience that while some dates are correct as compared with church records, other dates are off by a few days (perhaps the listing reflects the date of entry in the memorandum book).

This index includes nearly 650,000 immigrants who arrived at the Port of New York and filed initial petitions for citizenship in that region (MF NA 0001).

On microfiche the library has "Civil War Unit Histories, part 3, New Jersey" which includes all unit histories that have been published thus far (FICHE HIST 0003; stored in their vertical file along with a title list).

*The Morris County Chronicle*, a paper printed at Morristown, covering Morris County as a whole, is available on nine microfilm reels covering Dec. 7, 1877-Dec. 29, 1914 (MF NE 018).

## GUIDELINES FOR SUBMITTING QUERIES

We have had a number of recent requests for rules and guidelines for submitting queries for *The Archivist*. We have no formal rules except that only GSBC members may submit queries. As to guidelines, we have no hard and fast rules, and suggest that query writers scan previous printed queries for ideas for form, etc. A few general suggestions:

1. Be brief and concise, but give as much clearly written information as possible to help identify an individual (dates, places, relatives, etc.).
2. To avoid confusion, limit queries to one or two requests about the same individual or family. If you need information about more than one individual or family, write separate, additional queries.
3. Use common, clear abbreviations. If you're not sure of an abbreviation, use the complete word or term to avoid misunderstanding.

We welcome your queries and are happy to print them as space permits.

Genealogical Terms Defined

According to an item in the *Blauvelt News*, March 1994, some basic genealogical terms to learn and know include:

- *lineal* means ascending or descending in a direct line
- *collateral* means descended from the same ancestor, but not in a direct line of descent
- *allied families* are families which are usually related through marriage
- an *ancestry* begins with a single individual and traces back in time to include the male and female line of that person's ancestors
- a *genealogy* begins with a single ancestor and traces forward in time to include all descendants to the present

## Martha Ann Zabriskie's Memorandum Book

Martha Ann Zabriskie (1814-1838), of Saddle River, N. J. (dau. of Garret A. L. Zabriskie and Catherine Westervelt) kept this diary of local events from 1829 until her death, after which her sister, Adaline (who m., in 1855, George Esler) continued it until 1849.

The diary is a running account of mostly local births, deaths, and marriages, with an occasional reference to (usually extreme) weather, unusual local happenings, and national or worldwide events.

The following transcription was made by Pat Wardell from a typescript transcription of the diary (a copy of which is on deposit with the Bergen County Historical Society).

Some (but not all) of the remarks in parentheses probably were interpolated by the person who made the typewritten transcript. Bracketed comments have been interpolated by this editor.

Events listed should be used with care, as clues, and verified wherever possible by church or other records. It is this editor's experience that while some dates are correct as compared with church records, other dates are off by a few days (perhaps the listing reflects the date of entry in the memorandum book).

### Jordan-Banta-Blauvelt Correction

In March 1994 Lauren Maehrlein of New Milford, NJ wrote to Rev. Jay McIntosh, the pastor of the First Reformed Church of Hackensack, with a query to help clear up a probable error in a published genealogy. Lauren's aunt is descended from the Jordan family of early Bergen County, and she had asked Lauren to obtain a copy of the marriage record for Joseph Jordan and Marie Banta (or possibly Marie Blauvelt) which occurred 27 April 1833. Two different published genealogies had printed a record of the marriage of Joseph Jordan, but one genealogy named Maria Banta as the bride, and the other named Maria Blauvelt. Both said the couple was married by the Rev. James V. C. Romeyn at the First Reformed Church of Hackensack. Rev. Jay McIntosh wrote back: "The original church record book (volume 2) has an entry for April 27, 1833 which indicates that Hendrik Banta married Maria Demarest and Joseph Jordan married Maria Blauvelt. This was during the pastorate of James V. C. Romeyn and his son, James Romeyn, who began to assist him in 1833."

### GUIDELINES FOR SUBMITTING QUERIES

We have had a number of recent requests for rules and guidelines for submitting queries for *The Archivist*. We have no formal rules except that only GSBC members may submit queries. As to guidelines, we have no hard and fast rules, and suggest that query writers scan previous printed queries for ideas for form, etc. A few general suggestions:

1. Be brief and concise, but give as much clearly written information as possible to help identify an individual (dates, places, relatives, etc.).

2. To avoid confusion, limit queries to one or two requests about the same individual or family. If you need information about more than one individual or family, write separate, additional queries.

3. Use common, clear abbreviations. If you're not sure of an abbreviation, use the complete word or term to avoid misunderstanding.

We welcome your queries and are happy to print them as space permits.

## GSBC Notes

### By-Laws

At our September meeting we will be discussing and voting on revising the Society's By-Laws. This will be the first step toward incorporating the Society and applying for non-profit status. Revision of the By-Laws is necessary to include certain language defining our objectives as a non-profit corporation. Eventually it will allow for tax-deductible contributions to the Society.

**Land Measurement Terms and Guidelines**

All individuals doing research have at one time or another wondered about the system of measurements used by early surveyors. According to *The Family Tree* of June/July 1994, the basis of measurement was the Gunther chain invented by Edmund Gunther in 1620. The Gunther chain was 66 feet in length and consisted of a hundred links of 7-92/100ths inches each. It was made of #6 or #9 wire. The chain played an important role in today's system of measurement. Our rod is 16-1/2 feet or one-fourth of a chain. The mile is 80 chains. The acre is 10 square chains or 43,560 feet. The rod was also known as a pole.

**Martha Ann Zabriskie's  
Memorandum Book**

Martha Ann Zabriskie (1814-1838), of Saddle River, N. J. (dau. of Garret A. L. Zabriskie and Catherine Westervelt) kept this diary of local events from 1829 until her death, after which her sister, Adaline (who m. in 1855, George Esler) continued it until 1849.

The diary is a running account of mostly local births, deaths, and marriages, with an occasional reference to (usually extreme) weather, unusual local happenings, and national or worldwide events.

The following transcription was made by Pat Wardell from a typescript transcription of the diary (a copy of which is on deposit with the Bergen County Historical Society).

Some (but not all) of the remarks in parentheses probably were interpolated by the person who made the typewritten transcript. Bracketed comments have been interpolated by this editor.

Events listed should be used with care, as clues, and verified wherever possible by church or other records. It is this editor's experience that while some dates are correct as compared with church records, other dates are off by a few days (perhaps the listing reflects the date of entry in the memorandum book).

### Charity Ackerman's Memorandum

Charity Ackerman was born in Saddle River, NJ and lived there all her life. She was born 12 Jan 1819, the daughter of Gerrit Ackerman and Charity Hopper, and married 24 Dec 1839 Henry A. Achenbach ("of Mount Pleasant").

They are listed in the 1850 Federal Census, Bergen Co., Washington Twp. (Saddle River area), Dwelling #739, Family 809, living with the famly of John Achenbach, 54 (prob. Henry's father). Henry is listed as a farmer.

Her father left her the old homestead with mill.

She kept a memorandum/diary "containing a brief sketch of all the Births, Marriages and Deaths, Remarkable events, etc." which at one time was owned by Mrs. John G. Berdan of Saddle River. The following transcript was copied by Pat Wardell from two different typewritten manuscripts (one mimeographed and one a typewritten original) of diary entries. The typewritten original seems to be a reproduction of the wording of original entries and has been used here for the primary entry (the mimeographed version seems to be a distillation of entries reworded in more modern idiom). In the very first entry, below, both formats have been given to demonstrate the differences. Where they differ in fact or data, the differing item or words will be inserted in brackets. Some of the dates overlap with those recorded by Martha Zabriskie in her diary, and it is interesting to compare.

### A Note on Charity Ackerman's Memos re: Dater

Marjorie Smeltzer Stevenot sent us the following note on the 25 May 1836 entry in the Charity Ackerman Memorandum Book (*The Archivist*, August 1994, p. 8). The entry involves the marriage 25 May 1836 of John Young "Daty." This should be John Young Dater, who was the son of Adam Dater Jr. and Mary Young of Campgaw, NJ. John Y. Dater was a New Jersey State Assemblyman 1862-63, and a New Jersey Senator 1865-68. He was largely responsible for the development of Ramsey, NJ as a village, and founded *The Ramsey Journal* [in 1892], predecessor of *The Home and Store News*.

### Ramapo (NY) Presbyterian Church Register

Have you ever wondered about the old stone church trapped by the new Suffern, NY interchange of the New York Thruway, Routes 17 and 59? The Ramapo Presbyterian Church was begun as a simple white frame church in 1810 by Jeremiah Pierson and his associates at Ramapo Works — then the industrial center of Rockland County, NY. A flood and hard times forced the closing of the church in 1857. It reopened in 1862. In 1893 three new churches in the parish were dedicated — Ramapo (the stone church), Hillburn, and Brook Chapel,

under the mountain. The Rambo register was missing for 15 years! When Miss Helen Iserman died a couple of years ago, it was found in the attic of her home, where it had been stored for safe-keeping. It was returned to the Hillburn church. With the permission of Rev. Anthony Reif, Sr., Marjorie Smeltzer-Stevenot xeroxed 259 pages of the original register (1868-1918) and added 20 pages of index — members, marriages, baptisms, and funerals. The index was computerized by Marie Koestler as a contribution to the Genealogical Society of Rockland County. The register includes records of all three churches. Mrs. Stevenot has donated copies of this unique item to the Genealogical Society of Rockland County, the Genealogical Society of Bergen County, and the community libraries of New City, Suffern, Sloatsburg, and Tuxedo Park, all in NY. ■

### GUIDELINES FOR SUBMITTING QUERIES

We have had a number of recent requests for rules and guidelines for submitting queries for *The Archivist*. We have no formal rules except that only GSBC members may submit queries. As to guidelines, we have no hard and fast rules, and suggest that query writers scan previous printed queries for ideas for form, etc. A few general suggestions:

1. Be brief and concise, but give as much clearly written information as possible to help identify an individual (dates, places, relatives, etc.). The more info you give, the more likely someone will be able to connect with your ancestor.

2. To avoid confusion, limit queries to one or two requests about the same individual or family. If you need information about more than one individual or family, write separate, additional queries.

3. Use common, clear abbreviations. If you're not sure of an abbreviation, use the complete word or term to avoid misunderstanding.

We welcome your queries and are happy to print them as space permits.

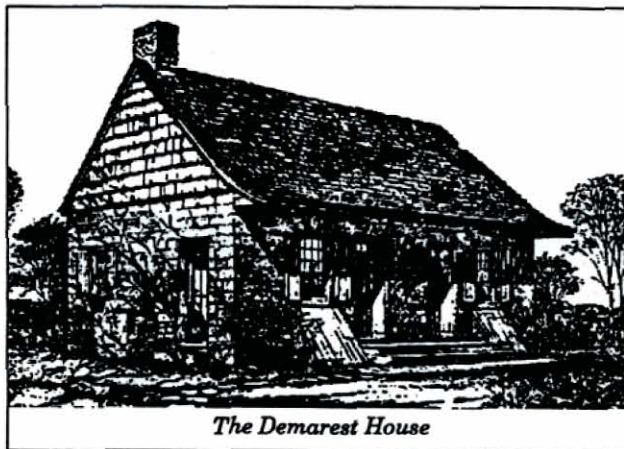
engaged in this activity, but if he was, that may explain how he met Miss Burr somewhere in New Jersey.

## Charity Ackerman's Memorandum

Charity Ackerman was born in Saddle River, NJ and lived there all her life. She was born 12 Jan 1819, the daughter of Gerrit Ackerman and Charity Hopper, and married 24 Dec 1839 Henry A. Achenbach ("of Mount Pleasant").

They are listed in the 1850 Federal Census, Bergen Co., Washington Twp. (Saddle River area), Dwelling #739, Family 809, living with the family of John Achenbach, 54 (prob. Henry's father). Henry is listed as a farmer.

Her father left her the old homestead with mill.

She kept a memorandum/diary "containing a brief sketch of all the Births, Marriages and Deaths, Remarkable events, etc." which at one time was owned by Mrs. John G. Berdan of Saddle River. The following transcript was copied by Pat Wardell from two different typewritten manuscripts, one mimeographed and one a typewritten original, of diary entries. The typewritten original seems to be a reproduction of the wording of actual entries and has been used here for the primary entry (the mimeographed version seems to be a distillation of entries reworded in more modern idiom). Where they differ in fact or data, the differing item or words will be inserted in brackets. Some of the dates overlap with those recorded by Martha Zabriskie in her diary (previously printed in *The Archivist*), and it is interesting to compare.

Events listed should be used with care, as clues, and verified wherever possible by church or other records.

## BERGEN COUNTY CIVIL WAR SOLDIERS

GSBC member Tom Wicks found the following listing of men from Bergen County who "responded to their country's call" during the Civil War — The Bergen Regiment — in a book, Ridgewood, Bergen County, New Jersey, Past and Present. The book was published December 31, 1916 by the Citizens Semi-Centennial Association of Ridgewood, N.J. The following was found on pp. 13-15.

The majority of citizens in this vicinity, responding to their country's call, were enlisted in Companies B and D of the Twenty-second Regiment. Before departing to join their regiment, they assembled in the Guard Room (Paramus Church). Rev. Mr. Corwin, after preaching a farewell sermon, gave each man a copy of the Holy Bible to take with him.
