New Jersey Newspapers

The New Jersey Archives has completed the microfilming of 3,100,000 pages of New Jersey newspapers. This was a five year project for almost every existing New Jersey newspaper published from 1777 to 1970. The films can be viewed at the Trenton, NJ Archives.

Orphan Train Heritage Society

According to a notice from the Monmouth County Genealogy Club, between 1853 and 1929 at least 200,000 children and several thousand adults participated in a relocation system for the urban poor. Some of the earlier placements were in CT, NJ, NY, and MA. Children soon went to PA and RI and to the upper New England states of ME, VT, and NH. As the years progressed the new homes were in the mid-west, south, and far west. The Orphan Train Heritage Society was founded in 1987. Oral histories are the focus, and individual histories are told in their newsletter, "Crossroads." Those seeking family information can receive some direction in

According to an item in the January 1995 newsletter of the South Central Pennsylvania Genealogical Society, European Focus Photography is a service offered by James A. Derheim, 700 N. The service provides photographs, videos, or color slides of ancestral hometowns in several European countries, including Germany, Netherlands, Belgium, Luxembourg, Austria, Italy, Switzerland, France, Hungary, England, Scotland, Ireland, Wales, and Spain. Mr. Derheim personally visits each site. He is a professional photographer, who will include village landmarks, important buildings, cemeteries, and ancestral homes if known. Tell them the amount and type of foreign currency you need. They will quote you the current rate of exchange and the total U.S. dollar equivalent, including the service charge. With your approval they will lock in the rate and process the transaction. You then mail your payment to them; upon receipt of your funds, they will mail you the draft(s) or initiate the electronic funds transfer. Ruesch International can also convert checks expressed in foreign currency to U.S. dollars, and will issue you the U.S. dollar equivalent. Call for details. ■

GUIDELINES FOR SUBMITTING QUERIES

We have had a number of recent requests for rules and guidelines for submitting queries for *The Archivist*. We have no formal rules except that only GSBC members may submit queries. As to guidelines, we have no hard and fast rules, and suggest that query writers scan previous printed queries for ideas for form, etc. A few general suggestions:

1. Be brief and concise, but give as much clearly written information as possible to help identify an individual (dates, places, relatives, etc.). The more info you give, the more likely someone will be able to connect with your ancestor.

2. To avoid confusion, limit queries to one or two requests about the same individual or family. If you need information about more than one individual or family, write separate, additional queries.

3. Use common, clear abbreviations. If you're not sure of an abbreviation, use the complete word or term to avoid misunderstanding.

We welcome your queries and are happy to print them as space permits.

◆ To Query No. 102, Nov 1994 *Archivist*, response from Frank J. Poole, 157 Fairmount Avenue, Hackensack, NJ 07601-3710 —

DEPERT — Because my great-greandmother, Johanne Christine, nee Schmidt, had been married to a Deppert in Germany, and some Depperts are supposed to be buried in plots owned by my great-grandfather, Lewis Foth, in the Berry Lawn Cemetery in Carlstadt, I have written to Mr. Deppert. There is a stone in the cemetery for Henry (born 6 Dec 1851, died 2 Jan 1927) and Barbara Deppert (born 28 Dec 1857, died 20 Sep 1929).

I have forwarded a roughly drawn family tree for John M. Deppert to Mr. Deppert, the querist.

◆ To Query No. 103, Nov 1994 *Archivist*, response from Pat Wardell, 78 Edgewood Road, Allendale, NJ 07401 —

MABIE — According to Westervelt, Bergen County Marriages, 1929, p. 27 (long out of print and currently being reprinted serially in this newsletter), Frederick Mabee m. 6 Feb 1806 1st Ref Church of Hackensack, NJ, by Rev. James C. V. Romeyn, Baletie Brinkerhoff.

One Beletje Brinkerhoff you might want to investigate (because she fits the time frame) is Beletje Brinkerhoff (Blinkerhoff), b. 1 Mar 1786; bp. 2 Apr 1786 Hackensack (recorded Schraalenburgh), who was probably the dau. of Jacob S. Brinkerhoff and his wife (poss. Geertje Huisman?). Jacob S. Brinkerhoff was the son of Seba Brinkerhoff and his wife, Beletje DeGroot. There were several other Brinkerhoff men in the appropriate time frame who married women with given names of Beletje, so there are surely other possible candidates for a daughter named Beletje as well as the one mentioned above.

◆ To Query No. 109, Feb 1995 *Archivist*, response from Pat Wardell, 78 Edgewood Road, Allendale, NJ 07401 —

FIELDING, VAN WINKLE — Hendrik Fielding and his wife, Aagtje Van Winckel had children baptized in the Ref. Dutch Church of Bergen. This church was founded in 1660 in the village of Bergen, which is now Jersey City (in what is now Hudson County), NJ. The baptismal, marriage, and burial records of the church, along with a history of the church, were originally published in the Year Books of the Holland Society of New York in 1913, 1914, and 1915. These were reprinted (three books in one) in 1976 by the Genealogical Publishing Co., and reprinted again in 1990 by the Genealogical Pub. Co. for the Clearfield Company.

Hendrik Fielding and Aagtje van Winckel had the following children baptized at Bergen: Jannetje, b. 28 May, bp. 21 June 1756; Catriena, b. 24 June, bp. 29 July 1759; Aegye, b. 19 Oct, bp. 25 Oct 1761; and Margrietye, b. 29 Aug, bp. 18 Sep 1763.

Jannetje Fielding (Fielden) may have m. Johannis Mutsker (Masker, Massaker?); they had a

child, Jacop, bp. at Bergen 27 Mar 1775. Aegye Fielden may have m. Jooris Cadmus; they had children bp. at Bergen — Jannetye, bp. 19 Mar 1780; and Aegye, bp. 4 Jan 1784.

A daughter (no name given) of Hendrick Fielden was buried from the church on 5 Dec 1753 (d. 4 Dec), and Henri Fielden d. 3 Oct and was buried from the church 5 Oct 1779.

◆ To Query No. 116, Feb 1995 *Archivist*, response from Pat Wardell, 78 Edgewood Road, Allendale, NJ 07401 —

RAPP — An Adam Rap m. 19 Nov 1785 Bergen (now Jersey City; see query response above), Arriaentje Pryer (Prior), b. 10 Nov 1764, bp. 11 Nov 1764 Bergen Ref Ch, dau. of Andries Pryer & Geertruy Sickels. They had two children bp. at Bergen Ref Ch: Geertruy Rap, b. 28 May, bp. 1 July 1787; and Johannis Rap, bp. 19 Dec 1788.

A Conrad Rep on 26 Mar 1760 leased 125 acres of land in the Ramapo (Romopock) tract from the East Jersey Proprietors. The Ramapo Tract encompassed several towns now in the northwest section of Bergen County. (The Minutes of the Board of Proprietors of the Eastern Division of New Jersey from 1725 to 1744, Perth Amboy, Vol. III, p. 333).

A Conrad Rapp was listed in the Franklin Township Rateables for 1779 and 1780. In 1779 he is listed with 100 acres of land and 13 horses and cattle. In 1780 he is listed with 50 acres improved land, 50 acres unimproved land, 1 horse, 3 horned cattle, and 1 hog. This may have been in the area of today's Waldwick and/or Allendale.

A Johan Cor. Rep and his wife Lisabeth had a son, Petrus Rep, bp. 25 June 1758 Paramus Ref Ch.

"Hohan H. Rapp" (probably a phonetic rendering of German pronunciation of "Johan") was listed in the Dec 1780 Franklin Twp. Rateables with 40 acres improved land, 60 acres unimproved land, 2 horses, 3 horned cattle and an illegible number of hogs.

◆ To Query No. 114, Feb 1995 *Archivist*, response from Pat Wardell, 78 Edgewood Road, Allendale, NJ 07401 —

ACKERMAN, RIGERSON, RYERSON — Garret J. Hopper, b. 2 May 1748, d. 19 Jan 1829, aged 80 (son of John A. Hopper), m (1) Marytje Zabriskie, bp. 15 Apr 1754 Paramus, d. 5 Mar 1781 (dau. of Jacob H. Zabriskie & Wyntje Terhune). Garret J. Hopper m. (2) Marytje (Maria) Ackerman, bp. 1 Feb 1756 Paramus, d. 29 Apr 1849 age 94; buried Paramus Chyd (dau. of Johannes Ackerman & Jacomyntje -? [according to querist, Jacomyntje Ryerson]). Garret is (I believe erroneously) listed as "Barrit" Ackerman in The Ackerman Family, compiled by Barbara W. Tobey, 1980, Vol. 1, p. 90.

Regarding Jacomyntje, another possible line of investigation would be into a Palatinate family whose surname (in early records) was often confused with Ryerson. Johan Philips Rüger came from (prob.) in or near Frankfurt am Main, Germany to New York with the Palatine emigration of 1709/10. He and John Christopher Kurtz were two doctors in constant attendance to the Palatines.

Johann Philipp Ruger and wife Anna Margaretha wit bp. 24 Aug 1714 NYCLuthCh ("at the house of Jan Loots, at Grenneck, Hackensack") of Anna Margareta, child of Philipp Pieter Grauberger and wife Anna Barbara.

Beware of confusion in early records of this family with the separate family of Ryerse/Ryerson. This name (Rüger) seems often to have been written Roeger, Reuger, Roeger, Kroeger, Rouger, etc., similar in early handwritten accounts, to "Ryerse."

Another Jacomyntje (who doesn't quite fit the time frame, but perhaps she died and another later child in the family was given the name) is the "Jacomyntje Ryers" who was bp. 21 Mar 1711 at Tarrytown, NY, the dau. of Michael Ryers and Margery Dobbs, who lived in the vicinity of Spuyten Duyvel. It is known that at least one of their children moved to Bergen County, NJ. Michael Ryers was the son of Reyer Michaelson and Jacomyntje Tibout, who lived at Fordham.

Charity Ackerman's Memorandum

Charity Ackerman was born in Saddle River, NJ and lived there all her life. She was born 12 Jan 1819, the daughter of Gerrit Ackerman and Charity Hopper, and married 24 Dec 1839 Henry A. Achenbach ("of Mount Pleasant").

They are listed in the 1850 Federal Census, Bergen Co., Washington Twp. (Saddle River area), Dwelling #739, Family 809, living with the family of John Achenbach, 54 (prob. Henry's father). Henry is listed as a farmer.

Her father left her the old homestead with mill.

She kept a memorandum/diary "containing a brief sketch of all the Births, Marriages and Deaths, Remarkable events, etc." which at one time was owned by Mrs. John G. Berdan of Saddle River. The following transcript was copied by Pat Wardell from two different typewritten manuscripts, one mimeographed and one a typewritten original, of diary entries. The typewritten original seems to be a reproduction of the wording of actual entries and has been used here for the primary entry (the mimeographed version seems to be a distillation of entries reworded in more modern idiom). Where they differ in fact or data, the differing item or words will be inserted in brackets. Some of the dates overlap with those recorded by Martha Zabriskie in her diary (previously printed in *The Archivist*), and it is interesting to compare.

Events listed should be used with care, as clues, and verified wherever possible by church or other records.

"Out of Ireland," a documentary tracing the story of the Irish from the famine-swept villages of 19th century Ireland to the industrialized cities of 20th century America, will air nationally on PBS stations on Wednesday, June 7, 1995 at 9:00 P.M. The filmmakers spent five years working closely with Kerby Miller, the world's leading Irish historian, using genealogical research to tell the story of, among others, Mary Ann Rowe, who in 1888 left her ancestral home in Dunnamaggan, Ireland, to find her fortune in America. German Research Aid

Genealogical Vocabulary: Relict? Consort?

Many old tombstones display the words Relict and Consort. These old usages are seldom found today. They are ways of identifying the status of a married or widowed woman at her death. "Jane Doe, consort of John Doe" would indicate that at the time Jane died, John was still alive. "Jane Doe, relict of John Doe" would indicate that at the time Jane died, her husband was already deceased.

GUIDELINES FOR SUBMITTING QUERIES

We have had a number of recent requests for rules and guidelines for submitting queries for *The Archivist*. We have no formal rules except that only GSBC members may submit queries. As to guidelines, we have no hard and fast rules, and suggest that query writers scan previous printed queries for ideas for form, etc. A few general suggestions:

1. Be brief and concise, but give as much clearly written information as possible to help identify an individual (dates, places, relatives, etc.). The more info you give, the more likely someone will be able to connect with your ancestor.

2. To avoid confusion, limit queries to one or two requests about the same individual or family. If you need information about more than one individual or family, write separate, additional queries.

3. Use common, clear abbreviations. If you're not sure of an abbreviation, use the complete word or term to avoid misunderstanding.

We welcome your queries and are happy to print them as space permits.

KOUGH — Johannes Post (John P. Post) m. (NJ license dated 18 Mar 1783) Catrintje Kogh (Catherine Coe). In the m. license record (William Nelson, *New Jersey Marriages*, p. 303), he was of "Saddle River." They had children, bap. at Paramus Ref. Ch.: (probably) Pieter Post, bp. 5 July 1789 Paramus (wit: Casparus & Maria Cough); and Samuel Post, b. 22 Aug, bp. 9 Oct 1791 Paramus (wit: Jacob and Maria Kogh).

To my limited knowledge there were at least two different families in the Bergen County, NJ—Rockland Co., NY area represented by these sound-alike surnames. One family is descended from the English Coe family, and its immigrant ancestor was Robert Coe, born in Suffolkshire in 1596, who arrived in Boston 10 June 1634 and settled in Watertown, MA. The Coe family came to Rockland County from Long Island.

The second family was possibly of German Palatine ancestry. This surname is generally found in early records spelled Cogh, Kough, Koch, etc., although care should be taken when researching either of these families, because early scribes seem to have used all sorts of spelling variants for both of these families. Perhaps another reader has more knowledge of these families.

RYERSON — According to Albert Winslow Ryerson's *The Ryerson Genealogy* (1916, p. 64) John G. Ryerson (son of Joris F. Ryerson & Mary R. White) and Neeltje Vreeland had two sons: Joris Ryerson (George), b. 19 Mar 1781, d. 1804, m. Lena Tice; and Abraham Ryerson, b. 15 Jan 1794, d. about 1852, m. Adeline Cooley.

◆ To Query No. 126, May 1995 *Archivist*, response from Pat Wardell, 78 Edgewood Road, Allendale, NJ 07401 —

SPARROWBUSH — Sparrowbush was an area in Upper Saddle River, Bergen County, N.J. extending into Rockland County, N.Y., so-called by about 1743. Today's Sparrowbush Road is in this vicinity, and dates from pre-Revolutionary times. Because Sparrowbush was an informal "neighborhood" and had no civil incorporation, no surveys were made of the area and so no definite boundaries ever existed for the locality. ■

Charity Ackerman's Memorandum

Charity Ackerman was born in Saddle River, NJ and lived there all her life. She was born 12 Jan 1819, the daughter of Gerrit Ackerman and Charity Hopper, and married 24 Dec 1839 Henry A. Achenbach ("of Mount Pleasant").

They are listed in the 1850 Federal Census, Bergen Co., Washington Twp. (Saddle River area), Dwelling #739, Family 809, living with the family of John Achenbach, 54 (prob. Henry's father). Henry is listed as a farmer.

Her father left her the old homestead with mill.

She kept a memorandum/diary "containing a brief sketch of all the Births, Marriages and Deaths, Remarkable events, etc." which at one

time was owned by Mrs. John G. Berdan of Saddle River. The following transcript was copied by Pat Wardell from two different typewritten manuscripts, one mimeographed and one a typewritten original, of diary entries. The typewritten original seems to be a reproduction of the wording of actual entries and has been used here for the primary entry (the mimeographed version seems to be a distillation of entries reworded in more modern idiom). Where they differ in fact or data, the differing item or words will be inserted in brackets. Some of the dates overlap with those recorded by Martha Zabriskie in her diary (previously printed in *The Archivist*), and it is interesting to compare.

Events listed should be used with care, as clues, and verified wherever possible by church or other records.

GUIDELINES FOR SUBMITTING QUERIES

We have had a number of recent requests for rules and guidelines for submitting queries for *The Archivist*. We have no formal rules except that only GSBC members may submit queries. As to guidelines, we have no hard and fast rules, and suggest that query writers scan previous printed queries for ideas for form, etc. A few general suggestions:

1. Be brief and concise, but give as much clearly written information as possible to help identify an individual (dates, places, relatives, etc.). The more info you give, the more likely someone will be able to connect with your ancestor.

ANSWERS

◆ To Query No. 118, May 1995 *Archivist*, response from Marjorie Smeltzer Stevenot, 150 Johnstown Road, Sloatsburg, NY 10974 —

KOUGH/COUGH — Originally a German Palatine name, quite a few of the Kough/Cough family were settled in southern Ireland by the English after the mass migration of 1709. One branch was headed by a widow, Katherine Kough. She was head of a Palatine family in Ireland in 1715 and in 1720 was on the estate of Abel Ram at Corey. The bulk of the group went to the Southwell estate in County Limerick. Others were Johan Mattys Kog, and Johan Phillipys Kog. German families often gave all the sons the same first name (Johann, e.g.) - the significant name is the second.

Many of the family anglicized the name to Cooke after their arrival. Some of the clan came to America with the Embury group in the 1760s. John and Phillip both signed a petition for lands in New York in 1763.

No doubt there were other branches which emigrated directly from the German states. The name may be pronounced in various ways. Remember the sentence "though the tough cough plough me through."

"Ough" is unpredictable.

For more about the Irish branches, consult Palatine Families in Ireland by Hank Jones. Jones (Henry Z.) has also published two other books listing German Palatine immigrants. I think you will find some families in the Bergen/Passaic area. ■

Charity Ackerman's Memorandum

Charity Ackerman was born in Saddle River, NJ and lived there all her life. She was born 12 Jan 1819, the daughter of Gerrit Ackerman and Charity Hopper, and married 24 Dec 1839 Henry A. Achenbach ("of Mount Pleasant").

They are listed in the 1850 Federal Census, Bergen Co., Washington Twp. (Saddle River area), Dwelling #739, Family 809, living with the family of John Achenbach, 54 (prob. Henry's father). Henry is listed as a farmer. Her father left her the old homestead with mill.

She kept a memorandum/diary "containing a brief sketch of all the Births, Marriages and Deaths, Remarkable events, etc." which at one time was owned by Mrs. John G. Berdan of Saddle River. The following transcript was copied by Pat Wardell from two different typewritten manuscripts, one mimeographed and one a typewritten original, of diary entries. The typewritten original seems to be a reproduction of the wording of actual entries and has been used here for the primary entry (the mimeographed version seems to be a distillation of entries reworded in more modern idiom). Where they differ in fact or data, the differing item or words will be inserted in brackets. Some of the dates overlap with those recorded by Martha Zabriskie in her diary (previously printed in *The Archivist*), and it is interesting to compare.

Events listed should be used with care, as clues, and verified wherever possible by church or other records.

GSBC member (and past president) Tom Wicks is always on the lookout for lists of names of Bergen County (and vicinity) residents to contribute to this newsletter. He found this typescript copy of an old Muster Roll in a book of "Rockland County Miscellanies," Vol. I, in the Sloatsburg, NY Library's Historical Room. This is likely a Revolutionary War era Muster Roll. Many of the names are familiar Rockland and Bergen County names, though the spellings are a bit quaint. Most spellings are phonetic — "say" them to yourself and you'll probably have no trouble recognizing the names. In addition, the phonetic spellings give us clues about the Dutch-influenced pronunciation of these names. Any reader recognize this list? Can you date it?

New Jersey Family Historian on Cable TV

Steven Conte is the host of "Family Historian" on CTN, the Cable Television Network of New Jersey shown on Tuesdays at 9:30 p.m.. "Family Historian" had its debut on September 5, 1995. Bergen County viewers can watch the program on channel 99.

German Research

According to *The Week in Germany* (March 17, 1995 issue), the Deutsche Zentralstelle für Genealogie in Leipzig (Saxony) has unrivalled source materials for research in eastern Germany and the parts of Pomerania, Prussia, and Silesia that were once German. Holdings include an extensive library of publications on family history, a collection of 100,000 personal documents, a genealogical card index that provides information on 1.4 million people, and a collection of 16,000 church registers dating back to the 16th century. While the Center cannot and will not do research for you, it can tell you if it might have materials of use for your own genealogical research. The more specific knowledge you have about where in Germany your family came from, and the time period involved, the more likely they will be able to help you. The address of the center as of March 1995 was Käthe Kollwitzstr. 82, 04109 Leipzig (tel. 03 41/4 01 11 13). The center is scheduled to move to new quarters sometime this year.

Start your searches for German forebears right here at home: much information is contained in the U.S. National Archives in Washington, D.C.

Volunteers Sought for Lawrence Line Historic Project

A project to document the historic East-West Jersey 1743 Lawrence Line is underway, sponsored by the Surveyor Generals of both East and West Jersey and by the New Jersey Society of Professional Land Surveyors and its Chapter members. The goal is to identify as many monuments as possible that mark the line so that they can, via "G.P.S." Global Positioning Surveying, accurately plot its exact location. They are seeking monuments, stakes, marked trees, etc. that identify the line. They also seek deeds and survey maps that reference Lawrence or Quintipartite Line (they have Lawrence's 1743 log). They also seek other maps that reference the location of the line (they have the 1777 and 1778 version of The Jerseys by Wm. Faden; the 1834 NJ map published by Finley and included with Gordon's Gazetteer; and the Thomas Debow resurvey of 1815 in "The Greenwood Tract." While the line did not fall in Bergen County, parts of it fell in Ocean, Monmouth, Mercer, Middlesex, Somerset, Morris, and Sussex Counties. GUIDELINES FOR SUBMITTING QUERIES

We have had a number of recent requests for rules and guidelines for submitting queries for *The Archivist*. We have no formal rules except that only GSBC members may submit queries. As to guidelines, we have no hard and fast rules, and suggest that query writers scan previous printed queries for ideas for form, etc. A few general suggestions:

1. Be brief and concise, but give as much clearly written information as possible to help identify an individual (dates, places, relatives, etc.). The more info you give, the more likely someone will be able to connect with your ancestor.

2. To avoid confusion, limit queries to one or two requests about the same individual or family. If you need information about more than one individual or family, write separate, additional queries.

3. Use common, clear abbreviations. If you're not sure of an abbreviation, use the complete word or term to avoid misunderstanding.

We welcome your queries and are happy to print them as space permits.

COURTER — I believe I have an answer to a query I sent concerning Aaron and Sophia Courter.

In the 1850 [Federal] Census for Bergen County,

Saddle River Township, p. 198 there is: Aaron Courter, 74; Sophia, 75; Abraham, 50; Ann, 40; David, 14; Benjamin, 6; Andrew, 6; William A., 46; and Edward Acker, 24.

In the 1860 [Federal] Census for Bergen County, Saddle River Township, p. 307 there is: William Courter, 56; Elisa, 41; Aaron, 4; John, 1; and Aaron, 83.

Return of Deaths of 1st of June 1862 to last day of Sep 1862 Saddle River Township, there is on "Feb 28th 1862 Aaron Courter, Male, Married, 85, Farmer, Small Lots, b. Machopin, Cause of death Old age."

A copy of the Hopper Cemetery - Saddle River Twp., Glen Rock, NJ, Fair Lawn Road, there is "Aaron Courter - Died Feb 18, 1862. Aged 85 yrs., 2 mo., 5 days." That would make Aaron's birthdate 23 Dec 1776. Nest on the list is "Courter - Sarah, wife of Aaron Courter - Died March 4, 1860. Aged 85 yrs., 6 mo., 16 days." That would make Sophia b. 19 Aug 1774.

Tobey, Barbara W., The Ackerman Family, vol. 1, 1980, p. 57, there is: "5.38 Sophia, d/o Abraham (4.24) b. 19 Aug 1775 bp. Pompton, wit: Johannis Ackerman and wife Elizabeth Post m. Evon Courtier. No known children."

I have concluded that Aaron or Evon Courter or Courtier and Sophia or Sarah Ackerman are the same persons and that they married and gave birth to at least three known children, being Abraham Courter b. 1801, d. 1891 m. Ann Marinus; William A. Courter b. 1804 m. Eliza Brown; and James Courter b. 1807, d. 1899 m. Hannah Forshee.

Hopper Cemetery is burial place for the descendants and in-laws of Peter Hopper b. 1745 and Anna Doremus b. 1750 living in the area of Small Lots, Saddle River Township now Glen Rock. Why would Aaron Courter and Sophia (Ackerman) Courter be buried in the Hopper Cemetery? Sophia (Ackerman) Courter's two sisters are Dorcas (Dirkie) Ackerman b. 1773 m. Garret P. Hopper buried Hopper Cemetery; and Elizabeth Ackerman b. 1776 m. Henry P. Hopper buried Hopper Cemetery. Garret and Henry are both sons of Peter Hopper and Anna Doremus.

John Duryee, Eleanor Bartholf (Lena), dau. of Hendrick Bartholf & his second wife, Elizabeth Allen. The marriage is recorded in Frances Westervelt's Bergen County Marriages, p. 49.

A Sara Weiler m. Johannes House (Haas, Haus) and they had children bp. at Tappan, NYC Ref Ch, Clarkstown, Ramapo Lutheran, Linlithgo Ref Ch, and Churchtown Luth Ch beginning 1747. Johannes was the son of Rynier Hous & his wife, Anna Elisabetha. Johannes House was b. Apr 1726 and bp. 29 May 1726 NYC Luth Ch. Johannes Houys and his wife Sara, wit. bp. 1 Jan 1756 at Tappan of Johanns, son of Jurrie Wieler and Maria Tennerie.

Other early Wielens/Wiellers etc. in the New York City/northern New Jersey/southern New York area include:

John Wiler, who m. Anna Margaretha -?. Joh. Wiler and his wife, Anna Margaretha, wit. bp. 13 May 1749 (at New York) NYCLuthCh of Anna Margaretha, dau. of Hans Haus (Johannes) and Sara (Wieler).

YOUMANS/YOEMANS, WOOD — John Yeomans, who was b. 8 Dec 1789 and died 13 Oct 1865, married Miriam Babcock (b. 28 Jan 1795 Rockland Co., NY) and they had (at least) 12 children, one of whom was a George Yeomans, possibly the George Yeomans you are seeking. This family lived in the vicinity of Stony Point in Rockland County, NY. Children of John Yeomans & Miriam Babcock were: Elizabeth, George, David, Ruth, Samson, Charles, William, Catherine, Job, Timothy, Dorcas, and Mary.

I have no further information on this family. ■

NYC Bank Books Shed Light on Irish Refugees

When the Emigrant Industrial Savings Bank in lower Manhattan opened for business on the night of September 30, 1850, one of those who opened an account was Patrick Egan, an Irish laborer from County

Galway. According to an item on the editorial page of the *New York Times* Thursday, 21 Sep 1995, a newly uncovered treasure trove of data in the bank's basement was discovered last year when an archivist, Marion Casey, asked to look at the 11 books containing details on depositors, mostly from the Irish community, plus 40 other volumes of mortgages and minutes of meetings.

The bank was founded in 1850 at the instigation of Archbishop John Hughes to help the flood of famine victims pouring into New York City by giving them a place to keep their money safe and a way to send money home to destitute relatives. Patrick Egan, when he opened his account, gave the information that he was single, a laborer in the Marine Quarantine Hospital on Staten Island, a native of Cormack in County Galway, and came to New York aboard the *Howard* on May 28, 1841. His parents, Owen and Mary Quinn, were dead. His sister Margaret lived in New York and their sister Bridget remained in Ireland.

The books have been donated to the New York Public Library's manuscript collection and should be available for public use in a few months. ■

SADDLE RIVER: THE STREAM, THE TOWNSHIP, AND THE BOROUGH

BCGS member Tom Wicks found the following article about the formation of the Borough of Saddle River in a clipping from the [Ridgewood, NJ] *Herald News* of 16 July 1959 (interpolations by this editor are in brackets). It seemed appropriate to add to it a bit of the background and history of the other two entities in northern New Jersey that (sometimes confusingly) went by the name Saddle River — the river and the Township.

from The Herald News, 16 July 1959: Saddle River Became a Borough 65 Years Ago

SADDLE RIVER — A dispute over a school law provided the incentive for the official formation of this borough in 1894. At that time the borough was part of Orvil Township but pulled out along with Upper Saddle River and Allendale leaving Ho-Ho-Kus and Waldwick to eventually split ten years later.

For 200 years prior to the formation of the municipality the history of the borough was one of pioneer struggle to clear the land for homes and farms. Originally settled by Thomas Van Buskirk from part of a tract purchased from Albert Zabarowsky, who was granted 1,200 acres by the Algonquin Indians, the story of the progress and growth is a story on a small group of familiar and prominent families. Names such as Ackerman, Conklin, Baldwin, Ackenback [Achenbach], Isler [Esler], and Pell crop up repeatedly throughout the years.

The strictly residential character of the borough today, however, was not the case during the last century. The abundant water power of the river attracted many mills producing such items as hats, shoes, cotton, baskets, and stockings. Saw mills and grist mills were common. One of the well known industries that lasted almost until the present day was the Packer Foundry, formerly the Ackerman Triphammer Foundry. When it

came into Mr. Packer's hands it became a carriage and farm implement foundry and later an automobile agency.

In 1839 the nearest stores were in Piermont [NY]. But with the coming of the telephone and electricity, farms were cut up and local industry faded.

The presence of many taverns leads one to believe that the original farmers were well to do. Thomas Van Buskirk built one that doubled as a town meeting place. Squire Post, who also meted out punishment to offenders at the whipping post on West Saddle River Road, opened the next one, while Cobus Ackerman's "Bulls Head," Henry Ackerman's "Washington House" and Abe Terhune's hotel are also mentioned with frequency.

During the early days, the town was noted for its newspaper. Called "The Landscape," it was published and edited by a crippled Negro, Alfred P. Smith. Mr. Smith published his paper for 20 years, ending with his death in 1902. It was reputedly the smallest paper in the country, measuring only six by eight inches. There were slaves in Saddle River until 1820 when New Jersey adopted legislation outlawing slavery. Mr. Smith was a carry over from those days. Remnants of an old slave cemetery can still be seen today in Upper Saddle River. Some of the writing on the stones is still legible, though quite faint.

Although the years have brought many changes to the adjacent area, Saddle River remains today as an almost unchanged monument to the Saddle River of the past. Amidst the bustling commercial and industrial world around it, the charm of this peaceful little community resounds throughout the countryside, and the same little river winds its way through the valley.

SADDLE RIVER: The River, the Township, and the Borough by Pat Wardell

There were two geographically separate locales in Bergen County, N.J. known by the name "Saddle River," taking their names from the stream flowing through or near them.

(1) **Saddle River** (the river). The river itself had several Indian names: Peramseapus, Rerakanes, Wieremus, Warepeake, Wawpack Run, Tackamack. As early as 1682 it was known as "Saddle River," believed to have been named by two Scotsmen, Capt. Matthew Nicoll and Richard Stillwell, after "Sadle Burn" in Argyllshire, Scotland. Within the bounds of present-day Upper Saddle River Borough, the Saddle River splits into the West Fork and the Tackamack. The Tackamack further north in Upper Saddle River Borough splits into the Middle Fork and Pine Brook or East Fork (Oost Val). The West Fork portion was earlier called Mactoktemach (1774), Machecamach (1781) and Machomack Brook (1787).

Citations and Usage of Name: 29 April 1682, "Sadle R."—New Jersey Archives (NJA), First Series, Vol. XXI, p. 78; 7 January 1685/6, "Sadle River"—NJA, First Series, Vol. XXI, p. 76; 29 November 1686, "Warepeake, Rerakanes, or Saddle River"—Indian deed to Capt. John Berry, NJA, First Series, Vol. XXI, p. 97; [10 December 1709], "Peramsepus"—Sonmans Deed

dated 10 December 1709, quoted in Cole's History of Rockland County, p. 259, "...a river called in Indian Peramsepus, and by the Christians Saddle River..."; 25 March 1742, "Sadol River"—Last Will & Testament of Johannes Meyer.

(2) **Saddle River Township**, an area of Bergen County near (and partially in) present Passaic County. There seem to be conflicting dates given for this township. It was called a "Precinct" before 1737. John P. Snyder (The Story of New Jersey's Civil Boundaries, 1606-1968) records that it was mentioned on March 20, 1716 in the Bergen Co. Freeholder's minutes. One source states that in 1737 it was created Saddle River Township, from area taken from New Barbadoes Township. In 1771 or 1772 part of its territory was set off to form Franklin Township. In 1797 part of its area went to Pompton Township. On February 21, 1798 Saddle River Township was incorporated. A large part of the area of Saddle River Township became part of Passaic County by act of February 7, 1837 and in 1837 part of its area went to Manchester Township in Passaic County.

On September 14, 1894 part of its area was set off to Glen Rock Borough. On December 22, 1894, part of its area was transferred to Lodi Borough. On January 2, 1895, some of its area went to Wallington Borough. In 1896 part was set off to Garfield Borough; in 1916 and 1917 parts went to East Paterson Borough. In 1924 part went to Fair Lawn Borough. On November 8, 1955 Saddle River Township became Saddle Brook Township.

(3) **Saddle River Borough**. The area east of Allendale was called Saddle River long before it was officially set aside as a borough.

A Saddle River Post Office existed here by 1852. Early Saddle River postmasters included Henry Esler (appointed 16 Mar 1852), John G. Esler (25 Nov 1884), Garret H. Winters (18 Sep 1885), John N. Leamon (7 Aug 1888), William F. Barkham (25 Sep 1889), Francis H. Storms (18 Apr 1893), and John G. De Baum (19 Apr 1897).

The community was organized as the Borough of Saddle River by referendum November 19, 1894 and incorporated November 22, 1894 from area taken from Orvil Township. On March 1 and May 1 of 1895, and also at a later date (possibly 1897?), and in 1903 and 1910 additional area was transferred from Orvil Township. In 1925 parts were transferred from Waldwick and Ramsey Boroughs.

The Saddle River Reformed Dutch Church was organized here as early as 1784. Saddle River Borough is 4.9 sq. miles in area. Population: 1909—1,000; 1940—816; 1980—2,763; 1990—2,950.

Another similar location name in Bergen County was **Saddle River Landing**. A Reformed Dutch Church at this locality was served about 1816-1826 by Wilhelmus Eltinge, who also served as minister to the Paramus Reformed Church from about 1799-1850. This church at Saddle River Landing seems to have been the reconstructed and remodeled Old Totowa (Paterson) Dutch Reformed church, and the neighborhood of "Saddle River Landing" probably included parts of the communities later known as Glen Rock, Fair Lawn and Paterson. ■
