GUIDELINES FOR SUBMITTING QUERIES

We have had a number of recent requests for rules and guidelines for submitting queries for *The Archivist*. We have no formal rules except that only GSBC members may submit queries. As to guidelines, we have no hard and fast rules, and suggest that query writers scan previous printed queries for ideas for form, etc. A few general suggestions:

 Be brief and concise, but give as much clearly written information as possible to help identify an individual (dates, places, relatives, etc.). The more info you give, the more likely someone will be able to connect with your ancestor.

To avoid confusion, limit queries to one or two requests about the same individual or family. If you need information about more than one individual or family, write separate, additional queries.

 Use common, clear abbreviations. If you're not sure of an abbreviation, use the complete word or term to avoid misunderstanding.

We welcome your queries and are happy to print them as space permits.

ANSWERS

◆ To Query 135 (in Nov. 1995 Archivist) concerning Hallenbeck, Bush, etc., response from Marjorie Smeltzer-Stevenot, 150 Johnsontown Road, Sloatsburg, NY 10974 —

HALLENBECK, BUSH — There are a number of Bush and Hallenbeck baptisms in the Parish Register of St.

John's Church, Greenwood (Episcopal), 1856-1923 (Arden, NY Orange Co.). Parents include Peter Bush and Mary Hallenbeck; Hudson and Mary Bush; Metilda Hallenbeck and James S. Bush; David and Matilda Bush. They were probably associated with the Greenwood Iron Works. For additional names consult the Monroe Township Federal Census records and the Orange County New York State Census. Abstracts of the Register were published in 1995.

The family may have moved after 1885 when Clove Furnace closed. Harrison O. Bush (b. 1890) and his wife Mary Allen (her mother was Henrietta Sloat) are buried in the churchyard at St. Johns in the Wilderness, Harriman State Park (NY).

Information submitted on the Bush (Bosch) family states that Henry Bush lived in the old farmhouse on Johnsontown Road, Sloatsburg, NY in 1760. Papers on file at the Orange Co. Genealogical Society in Goshen, NY.

In 1800 Henry Bush purchased acreage west of Stony Brook (Johnsontown Road) from the Surveyor General (sale of "vacant lands") The Pellitreau map of early deeds (Cole's History of Rockland County) shows him in possession of 400 acres.

In the 1790 census Peter Bush had a wife, a son over 16 and a daughter. Peter Jr. a wife and 2 daughters. Richard Bush (may be a different line) had a wife, two daughters, and 3 sons under 16. This may be the Bush who lived near the NJ border in the Tallman/Masonicus region. I understand there are three Bush lines: Dutch, German, and English. They are not related.

Eshuysen may be a variation of Eckerson. Consult the Eckerson/Ackerson family history.

◆ To Query 134 (in Nov. 1995 Archivist) concerning Van Buskirk, Concklin, Johnson, Harmanse, response from Marjorie Smeltzer-Stevenot, 150 Johnsontown Road, Sloatsburg, NY 10974—

VANBUSKIRK, CONCKLIN, HARMANSE — Jacobus (James) Van Buskirk owned a mill right on the Mahwah River in 1775. It was sold to him in 1762 by David Ackerman who had obtained it from the Proprietors of East New Jersey. It was purchased by John Suffern soon after the Revolution and when valid title could be obtained.

Jacobus also owned a mill near Sherwoodsville, NY (now Wesley Hills). He operated it as a grist mill, later a bark mill. (Cole's History of Rockland County)

Jinnie Buskirk (Van Buskirk) married John J. Concklin at Brick Church, Kakiat, 21 July 1793. John was born 11 Jan 1771, son of John and Catherine Conklin. A daughter Katterye was baptised at Brick Church 20 May 1793. Another daughter, Tiny, married Samuel Johnson; both are buried in Ladentown, NY.

Harmanse — Dowe Harmanse was one of the early settlers of Orangetown, Orange County (now Rockland). A Patent granted to Tappan settlers in 1686 noted one of the boundaries as land belonging to Dowe Harmanse and Claes Janse. Janse may be the father of Jannetje Jans.

Some of the families in Orangetown also owned land in adjacent Bergen County, NJ.

In the 1790 Census, Thomas Van Buskirk had a wife and one son over 16. James had a wife, one son over 16, two daughters and a slave. John had a wife, 3 sons under 16, and a daughter. All in Haverstraw Precinct.

◆ To Query 147 (in Nov. 1995 Archivist) concerning the origin of the name of Hasbrouck Heights, response from Pat Wardell, 78 Edgewood Road, Allendale, NJ 07401 —

HASBROUCK HEIGHTS — Hasbrouck Heights is a Bergen County, N.J. Borough which was organized July 31, 1894 (referendum) from area taken from Lodi Township. It was incorporated as Hasbrouck Heights Borough August 2, 1894. In 1901 part of its area was transferred to Lodi Borough; in 1905 some area was transferred to Hasbrouck Heights from Lodi Township. On July 5, 1918 part of its area was transferred to Teterboro Borough.

Earlier known as Polifly and Corona. The name Corona was changed about 1890 to Hasbrouck Heights to avoid confusion with Corona, NY (on Long Island). The name Hasbrouck Heights was chosen to honor J. D. Hasbrouck, then General Manager of the New Jersey and New York Railroad.

VAN BUSKIRK — I came across the names of Laurens Andriessen and Peter Van Boschkerck (Buskirk) when I was researching the history of the old Lutheran Church in Hackensack. This history is part of the Anniversary book written for the Centennial of our

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church, St. Mark's Ev. Lutheran Church in Hackensack.

The Genealogical Society library has a two-volume genealogy (containing about 1800 pages) on the Van Buskirk family ... by Irene English Shoemaker. [Ed. note: see above answer to same query for details on this book and where to find it outside of the Bergen County area.] The section on the Pieter Van Buskirk family consists of 51 pages.

However, Mr. Milligan will try to answer one or two specific questions if the material is available — NOT "tell me all about ..." or research a family in depth. There is no fee, but there is a charge for birth, marriage, and death certificates and photocopies. The Early Lutheran Church in Hackensack

(excerpted from a book published for the centennial of Saint Mark's Church in Hackensack)

Lutheranism in Hackensack started almost 300 years ago when a small church was built on the shore of the Hackensack River. The first settlers in the Hackensack area were chiefly Dutch who arrved in Bergen County around 1640. Until 1704, the only Lutheran churches in this area were in New York City, Albany, and in the Pennsylvania and Delaware area. The New York and Albany congregations had been without a pastor since 1691.

The churches in America were still dependent on Europe to obtain pastors. Being unsuccessful for ten years in obtaining a pastor from the Lutheran Church in the Netherlands, the few surviving Elders of the New York Church went to talk to the Swedish Lutherans who had become established along the Delaware River. Andreas Rudman, pastor of the Swedish Lutherans at Wicacoa, had just recovered from a serious illness, during which time another pastor had come from Sweden to take his place. This permitted Pastor Rudman to accept the call to New York City. But a year after he arrived in 1702, an epidemic of Yellow Fever sprung up. Because of his previous ill-health, Pastor Rudman decided to return to Delaware, again leaving the New York Lutheran Churches without a pastor.

In the long run, this turned out to be a piece of good luck. Justus Falckner, who had been a member of Pastor Rudman's congregation near Philadelphia, had been educated for the ministry at Halle, Germany, Instead of being ordained, he had chosen a business career with his brother Daniel (who also had studied for the ministry) in America. Pastor Rudman convinced Justus Falckner to accept the call to New York.

On November 24, 1703, Falckner was ordained by Rudman, who had the "authority to ordain" from his bishop in Sweden. Justus Falckner thus became the first Lutheran to be ordained in America. His ordination is also of special interest in that it is the earliest recorded instance of the use of an organ in church services in the United States. A group of German Pietists in the Wissahickon Valley in Pennsylvania provided an orchestra and a small organ for the service.

The Reverend Falckner turned out to be a pastor of thorough education, deep spirituality, and great vigor. In addition to his abundant labors as pastor, he wrote and published a handbook of Christian doctrine. He also wrote a hymn which after three centuries still holds a place in our current hymnals: Hymn number 182, "Rise, O Children of Salvation."

Arriving in New York, he found the conditions of the two Lutheran churches in New York City and Albany to be in deplorable condition. He quickly started on the restoration of the two congregations. He then began to minister to Lutherans wherever they had settled. This shortly brought him to Hackensack Township, where on February 27, 1704, he performed his first ministerial acts by baptizing three local infants. With these acts he

founded the first Hackensack Lutheran Church.

Why did Pastor Falckner establish a Lutheran

congregation in Hackersack?

A Dane, Laurens Andriessen (a patronymic which means Lawrence, son of Andries, or Andrew's son), was born about 1630 in Holstein. He emigrated from Holland in 1655 and first settled in New Amsterdam where he practiced his trade as a turner. About 1662 he settled in Bergen Town (now Jersey City) and became prominent in the affairs of that town. He served in various official capacities under both Dutch and English jurisdiction, including brander of horses, member of the Governor's Council and the Provincial Legislature, Bergen County's first Coroner, Justice of the Peace, Judge, and President of the County Court.

In 1676 he headed a group of settlers (including the Bogert, Westervelt, Banta, Brinkerhoff and other families) to purchase farmland along the Hackensack River. A series of land patents were granted in Hackensack Township, which included the land between the Hudson and the Hackensack Rivers.

In 1658 Laurens Andriessen had married a widow, Jannetje Jans from Norway. She had four sons by her first husband and four sons by Laurens, Jannetje Jans died in 1694; her husband had died sometime earlier. When Laurens Andriessen and other Lutherans came to the new world, they brought with them the spirit of piety and devout faith to the church of their fathers in the old country. As was customary in those days, surnames were taken from personal characteristics, occupations, origins, etc. Probably because of Laurens' piety, his children were named van Boschkerck — meaning "of the wood church." later the spelling was changed to Van Buskirk.

One son, Laurens van Boschkerck, built a stone house on Kings Road (which is now River Road in Teaneck) and settled down with his wife Hendrikje and their five children.

By 1700, the areas that are now North Hackensack and the northern part of Teaneck were principally settled by Lutherans. Many of these families, including the van Boschkercks, maintained business and church interests in New York. Andreas van Boschkerck was a warden of the New York church. Laurens van Boschkerck was vorsteher (Kirch-meister). Thus, it appears logical that only a few months after Pastor Justis Falckner arrived in New York, he sailed up the Hackensack River and held church services there.

On February 27, 1704, Pastor Falckner baptized three infants in the barn of Cornelius van Boschkerck at "Hackinsack." These baptisms were the first ministerial acts recorded in Falckner's private "Kerchen-Boeck" (Church Book) for the Hackensack Lutheran Church. [The baptisms were of Dirck, son of Mattheus Corneliussen and Trinje his wife; Laurens, the son of Lauren van Boschkerck and Henrikje his wife; and Alida, the daughter of Rudolph Berg and Catherine, his wife.]

In April of that same year, Pastor Falckner baptized Antje, daughter of Pieter van Boschkerck in New York. Pastor Falckner returned to Hackensack in July and October 1704 to baptise other infants. Records show him coming to the Hackensack congregation a few

times each year to perform baptisms and marriages. While he was absent visiting other congragations, he appointed "vorlessers" (Lay Readers) to conduct the services.

Within twelve years, Pastor Falckner was serving three congregations in New Jersey and four in New York. He traveled about 1,200 miles each year to minister to approximately 200 communicants in these seven congregations. His field extended from Albany along the Hudson River to New York and Long Island, and to the Hackensack, Ramapo and Raritan churches in New Jersey. He most likely traveled by canoe and horseback to reach some of these congregations.

In 1716, Laurence van Boskeark donated a plot of land for the Hackensack Church building. A substantial building was completed within the four years as required by the deed, and the Hackensack Lutheran congregation continued to grow.

Genealogical Tools: PERSI

PERSI stands for <u>Per</u>iodical <u>Source Index</u>, a finding tool for locating genealogical and historical articles printed in the more than 2,000 journals and newsletters published by genealogical and historical societies in the United States and Canada that are held in the collections of the Allen County Public Library in Fort Wayne, Indiana. In 1986, this major genealogical library began its annual PERSI index, and it soon added retrospective indexes of earlier journals from 1847-1985.

PERSI is divided into five sections: U.S. Places, Canadian Places, Other Foreign Places, Research Methodology, and Families (for articles specifically focusing on a particular surname). The locality section is further categorized by types of records: biography, cemetery, census, church, court, deeds, directories, history, institutions, land, maps, military, naturalizations, obituaries, other, passenger lists, probate, school, tax, vital records, voter, and wills. Remember that what is indexed is the subject of the article. Individual names within an article (cemetery lists, census, etc.) are not indexed. Also be sure to check each annual index, plus the retrospective indexes.

Now you can access PERSI on microfiche (18 fiche) at any LDS Family History Center in the United States and Canada.

Once the articles desired have been identified, you can locate them in the periodicals held in nearby libraries, if available, or order photocopies of the articles from the Allen County Public Library. The address is available at the beginning of the PERSI, with instructions for ordering. The handling fee is \$5 (for up to 8 articles requested at the same time) plus a photocopying charge of about 20¢ per page.

In 1638, Gerrit Hendrickson Blauvelt arrived from Holland at Swede's Landing, aboard the Swedish ship *Kalmer Nyckel*. L.D.S. Family History Centers is the **Old Parochial Register** (OPR), which contains the names of Church of Scotland ancestors extracted from pre-1854 parish registers. It is limited to Church of Scotland records and does not include non-conformist churches. You may enter just the ancestor's name, or you may filter, searching only a specific geographical locality, or only certain years, or the marriage partner. OPR has a parent search feature and you may create and print a holding file. (From *In Search of Ancestors*, a publication of Brigham Young University Elderhostel instructors.)

Early Estates Probated at Boston

According to Elizabeth Pearson White, author of "Finding Elusive New Englanders" in *The National Genealogical Quarterly* June 1982, during the Andros administration, from 1686 to 1692, estates from all over New England, New York, and even New Jersey were brought to Boston for probate if they were worth more than \$50. Ms. White cited Milton Rubincam's Genealogical Research: Methods and Sources, Vol. I, revised 1980 (p. 142) — this book is in our Society library.

"Doctors at the Gate" — Ellis Island Display

An exhibit entitled "Doctors at the Gate: The United States Public Health Service at Ellis Island" will be on display at the Ellis Island Immigration Museum in New York from May 24 through July 31, 1996. From the time that Ellis Island opened as an immigration station in 1892, the Public Health Service (PHS) was responsible for the medical inspection of arriving immigrants. The PHS built hospital facilities on the Island to provide the medical care required by some of the arriving immigrants. By 1924, more restrictive laws had greatly slowed the flow of immigrants to the United States, but the PHS hospital on Ellis Island remained open until 1954. The exhibit will occupy six rooms at the Museum, and will cover the founding and early history of the PHS, the beginnings of quarantine, medical inspection of immigrants, the hospital facilities at Ellis Island, and the structure and functions of the PHS today. GUIDELINES FOR SUBMITTING QUERIES

We have had a number of recent requests for rules and guidelines for submitting queries for *The Archivist*. We have no formal rules except that only GSBC members may submit queries. As to guidelines, we have no hard and fast rules, and suggest that query writers scan previous printed queries for ideas for form, etc. A few general suggestions:

1. Be brief and concise, but give as much clearly written information as possible to help identify an individual (dates, places, relatives, etc.). The more info you give, the more likely someone will be able to connect with your ancestor.

To avoid confusion, limit queries to one or two requests about the same individual or family. If you need information about more than one individual or family, write separate, additional queries.

 Use common, clear abbreviations. If you're not sure of an abbreviation, use the complete word or term to avoid misunderstanding.

We welcome your queries and are happy to print them as space permits.

RIKER, DuBois — Abraham Reyker (1721-1820) and Elizabeth Conklin (1727-1809) had at least four sons, each of whom had a son named Abraham:

- (1) Samuel Reyker (1768), wife Rachel Moor. Son Abraham b. 1790.
- (2) Gerardus Reyker (1758), wife Margrietje Nagle. Son Abraham b. 1780.
- (3) Abraham Reyker (1753), wife Elizabeth Vervelen. Son Abraham bp. Tappan 1782 (m. Eliza Gracy).
- (4) Theunis Reyker (1770), wife Eleanor Moor. Son Abraham b. 1792.

John Reyker was the second husband of Margrietje Blauvelt. They had sons Jacob (name of Margrietje's father) and Abraham. His father may have been Abraham. He does not, however, appear to be a brother of the above Reykers.

Comparison of the names of the children of each might be helpful.

Dubois — Joseph DBois, b. 8/17 1801, bp. Tappan was the son of Rynier DuBois and Elizabeth Quidor. They may be the parents of Hannah also. Joseph married Elizabeth Conklin, daughter of Jacob Conklin and Mary Quidor. These families are usually associated with Palisades, NY and Harrington Park, NJ. ■

SURFING THE GENEALOGICAL 'NET'

As more and more of us are learning to use computers and modems, more and more interesting genealogical resources are becoming available on the Internet. This column (planned to appear in each issue of the *Archivist*) will be a way for us to share our internet finds.

Internet Mailing Lists and Newsgroups

What are they? Mailing Lists and Newsgroups are internet forums for the exchange of information (usually ideas, personal comments, opinions, referrals, and citations) dealing with a particular interest (such as genealogy, history, etc.). And within each general field of interest, there may be dozens or even hundreds of even narrower fields of interest — such as ethnic or geographical divisions of the general topic genealogy (for instance, Irish research; New Jersey; a specific surname). Mailing Lists are, unlike some bulletin boards, not server-specific. You can access any Mailing List no matter whether you get there by a large commercial server like America Online, Prodigy, or Compuserve, or whether you log on with a local network. Mailing Lists are maintained on computers all over the world (many of them connected with colleges and universities).

How do they work? Basically, a List works this way: anyone who has "subscribed" to the List may send an email message dealing with the field of interest with which the List is concerned. Each individually sent email sent to the List is then "broadcast" to the entire List; in other words, every subscriber to the List will receive every e-mail message sent to the List address. Some List members may wish to answer, or comment on, your message. And still other List members may wish to answer or comment on those responses. This chain of e-mailed messages resulting from one original e-mail post, is called a "thread."

Some Lists are run by a computerized system or program, which automatically "airs" each e-mail message to the entire List. Others are — more and more rarely — run by a human moderator, who may or may not read messages before broadcasting them, and may or may not censor or return any that might be considered off the topic, or in bad taste. Some Lists generate huge volumes of e-mail, resulting in literally a hundred or more individual messages being automatically sent to each subsciber every day. With each message needing to be downloaded at your end, if you pay your server by the message, or by the hour, you might not wish to remain on such prolific Lists. Other Lists may generate less than a half dozen messages a day.

How do you join a List? In the internet jargon, you "subscribe" to a List (and when you wish to be removed from its broadcasts, you "unsubscribe.") Often this is done by sending an e-mail to an address of a computerized program for compiling and maintaining the subscriber membership of the List. Examples of these programs are found in addresses containing the words "Majordomo" and "Listserv." The procedure for joining a List is specific to each List, but in general, to join a list, one sends an e-mail post to the subscription address with a message in the body of the e-mail requesting to be added to the List. In most cases these requests are processed by a computer, so there is no tolerance for error, and it is important that the words, symbols, and spaces used in addresses be entered following precisely the protocol described for each List. Some addresses may even be case sensitive.

As an example of subscription protocol, to subscribe to the Public History List, in the "To" address field write:

listserv@indycms.iupui.edu

and in the message field write:

subscribe publhist [your name]

In the [your name] space, you would write your actual name, not your screen name/screen address. Some directions specify [firstname] [lastname]. For instance, in my case (my name is Pat Wardell, and my screen name or address is PatWardell@aol.com), I would write in the message field:

subscribe publhist Pat Wardell

Some list manager programs or moderators request your address in the body of the message (this means your screen name/screen address) instead of your actual name.

The subject line is usually ignored, so you can leave

it blank if your e-mail program will permit that.

You will soon (usually within a day; sometimes within an hour) receive an e-mail message advising you that the request to subscribe was successful and that you are now a member of the List. Usually you will be sent basic instructions for List activities: how to send messages to the List, how to make requests, how to end your List subscription, etc. Sometimes there will be additional List "rules" or suggestions for proper List behavior. You should file this basic information post on your hard drive or some other easily accessible place, so that when you need or want to unsubscribe, for example, you will be able to read the correct procedure for doing so.

One of the very basic rules of internet courtesy in e-mail messages is DON'T YELL. (Typing in all uppercase letters is like screaming on the internet.) Most people like to "lurk" (read the List mail without participating in the discussions) for a short time before becoming actively involved. By doing this for a brief time, you will learn a great deal about the do's and don'ts of any particular List, plus you will begin to sense the tenor of that List.

If you will be away from your computer for any length of time (on vacation, for example) you will probably want to unsubscribe so that when your mailbox fills to capacity, messages will not be bounced back to the original senders.

What follows are some Lists of genealogical and/or historical interest and some interesting world wide web sites. The western end of #192 Pieter Pieterse's property in Lot #3, Kakiat Patent in Bergen County had caves and was a refuge and stopover for Loyalist followers. #192 Pieter and his son #701 Myndert were put in jail in Poughkeepsie for a time in 1779. His son #694 Abraham was a spy for the British and left the US for Canada after the Revolution. Another son, Casparus also left for *Canada after the war. This son Casparus is not listed in the Mabie Compendium. Another son #692 Pieter Petrus is listed as dying young in Howard Durie's book, The Kakiat Patent in Bergen County, New Jersey.

THE WICKS FAMILY JOURNEY

Significant Occurances Through the Maze of My Genealogical Research

by Thomas Owen Wicks 636 Fox Court, Ridgewood, NJ 07450

I hope that by sharing my experience as a family historian others will glean some information, tried and true research methods or inspiration which will encourage them to continue uncovering ancestral puzzles. Welcome to a brief look at my fifteen year search for a living extended family.

The pursuit of my family history has taught me many things. One, which might be the most important, is to ask for help. Don't be shy! What I share with you now is part of my exciting journey, going back one hundred fifty years through the labyrinth of my family's migration from Ireland/ England to finding them in America, a journey going back to 1839 in New York City.

My entrance into the maze of my family's past began with a letter I was given in 1980, written by my aunt Beatrice Wicks Bond, and sent to my cousin Elise Wicks Birgmingham, dated June 1965. That bit of memory was first hand, much of it written from living in a family, remembering people, stories and events. I was fortunate that Aunt Bea had a sharp mind when she wrote our family history in a brief narrative of just three paragraphs including a few pages of family linkages. The letter reads: "Dear Elise, Rose Anna Cassidy who was a child of the daughter (Mary Casey) of one of the Absentee-Landlords (English - John Casey) who has "Estates" in Ireland and of the Game-Keeper (employee John Cassidy) on her father's place. He (John Casey) is supposed to have disinherited her (Mary Casey Cassidy). When her husband died the Masonic Lodge paid for her (Mary Casey Cassidy) and her children (Rose Anna and Mary) to come to U.S.A. We don't know when or where she (Mary Casey Cassidy) died but her two daughters were "farmed out." Mary Cassidy to a Catholic family who brought her up in their religion and she married and had one daughter we only knew as "Dolly."

Rose Anna was raised by a Quaker family and they brought her up in their beliefs. She married a man named Smith and had one daughter Anna Smith who married a Wicks, I believe his first name was Edward. When Mr. Smith (h. of Rosana Cassidy) died she married a cousin or uncle of her son-in-law, Thomas Wicks (my gt. grandfather).

Thomas Wicks was born in England, served in the British Army as a drummer boy in the Battle of Lucknow. At the time of the Civil War he came to the U.S. and enlisted in the old 69th Regiment. He was discharged as a Quartermaster Sergeant. A daughter Mary F. (Minnie) married Alex Jansen, Jr. — Affectionately, "Aunt Bea."

The article, written by Jennifer Weitzman, quotes Karen Isaacson, manager of the ROOTS-L, the largest on-line genealogy mailing list: "Genealogy is one of the hobbies where the more people are doing it, the more synergy you get. Genealogy hit critical success in the past year because there are enough people out there searching and reading each other's questions that odds are somebody is going to have an answer." Revolutionary War Pension Records

Did your ancestor serve in the American Revolutionary War? Many men who served in the Revolution and their wives never applied for a pension for war service. Some of the records available, including rateables and tax lists, are not clear in describing whether or not a person served in the war. During a search of the pension application (R10912) of Hermanus Van Zile, a suspected relative and neighbor of my known ancestors, I found a wealth of genealogical information. To convince the US government that Hermanus Van Zile did in fact serve in the war, since records during the war were few and far between, depositions were heard in district courts by respected citizens who were personally aquainted with Hermanus Van Zile and testified to his war service. Among other things in the depositions, I found his father was Peter Van Zile, who served two months in his place during the war; and another suspected relative, Henry Masker, served with Hermanus Van Zile during the war. Since Peter Van Zile and Henry Masker did not apply for pensions, this may be the only record available to show that they did serve in the American Revolution. If you can't find any record of your ancestor's war service, I suggest you look at the rateables and tax lists of the period of the Revolutionary War 1775-1781 and find a neighbor of your ancestors who did apply for a pension and read that record. Pension applications are on microfilm in alphabetical order for all persons who applied for a pension. Philip O'Leary III

GUIDELINES FOR SUBMITTING QUERIES

We have had a number of recent requests for rules and guidelines for submitting queries for *The Archivist*. We have no formal rules except that only GSBC members may submit queries. As to guidelines, we have no hard and fast rules, and suggest that query writers scan previous printed queries for ideas for form, etc. A few general suggestions:

 Be brief and concise, but give as much clearly written information as possible to help identify an individual (dates, places, relatives, etc.). The more info you give, the more likely someone will be able to connect with your ancestor.

To avoid confusion, limit queries to one or two requests about the same individual or family. If you need information about more than one individual or family, write separate, additional queries.

3. Use common, clear abbreviations. If you're not sure of an abbreviation, use the complete word or term to avoid misunderstanding.

We welcome your queries and are happy to print them as space permits.

— not to be confused with Ramapo Township in
Rockland County, New York.

Post — I believe we are researching the same line. I have found the following persons buried in Union Cemetery, Ramsey, Bergen, NJ.

My g.g. grandmother Catherine Post married (1) Thomas Demarest and (2) John Hicks. It is her first husband who is buried adjacent to the Posts. I have not been able to identify her parents either nor do I know her exact relationship to the above. Catherine was born about 1811 and married T. Demarest 2 Jan 1832, Kakiat. I suspect that the John A. Posts are one and the same. However, the fact that no William was identified in his father's will makes one wonder. Perhaps others can shed some light on this family.

EARLY BERGEN COUNTY CHURCHES

by William Nelson (contributed by and with an introduction by Robert D. Griffin)

Most New Jersey genealogy researchers are quite familiar with the multiple volume series of New Jersey Archives. In the course of seeking material for the publication of Vol. XXII in the series ("Marriage Records, 1665-1800"), the author and eminent New Jersey historian William Nelson (in his own words) "made extensive inquiries regarding the existence and condition of church records in New Jersey, particularly in the northern part of the state."

The vital records data he collected from each church was included in the New Jersey Archives publication, released in 1900 and in several subsequent reprints over the years. The general knowledge Nelson gained about the history of New Jersey church records was presented in an article that appeared in the Journal of the Presbyterian Historical Society (March and June 1904), entitled "Church Records in New Jersey." Subsequently, it was published by the Paterson History Club, in 1904, as a 32-page pamphlet.

In the article, Nelson briefly describes the principal churches that existed in 1800 in the following New Jersey counties:

Bergen Passaic Middlesex Somerset
Morris Warren Essex Union
Sussex Hunterdon Monmouth

Following a short narrative history of the churches in each county is a list of record groups presented in alphabetical order by town, along with notes regarding those that had been published (as of 1904).

What follows is Nelson's narrative history of churches in Bergen County.

The early Dutch churches as a rule were scrupulously careful to keep and preserve in the church archives registers of baptisms and marriages. The churches of other denominations not only were not so particular, but when the records were made they were often regarded as the private property of the pastors, and were carried away by them on their removal to other charges.

The first Reformed (Dutch) church in New Jersey was that at Bergen, dating back to 1662. Its records of baptisms, marriages, deaths, and members, from 1664-1666 to date are remarkably complete. This was in 1800 the only church within the present Hudson County.

Bergen County had a number of churches in 1800, as follows: Hackensack, established in 1686; its records of baptisms, marriages (lacking 1753-1789), communicants, elders, and deacons are well kept, beginning with the original parchment-bound volume. Schraalenburgh, 1724; similar records. Ponds (originally te Noorde, "at the North," now Oakland), 1710; records destroyed about 1865, by fire. Paramus,

1725; no marriage records have been preserved before 1799. The baptismal records extend back to about 1740. They were kept in a peculiar fashion — the names of children baptized were arranged neither chronologically nor by families, but in the alphabetical order of their Christian names; that is, all the Abrahams, Aarons, Andrews, etc., are grouped together, followed by the Benjamins, the Davids, the Edwards, etc. The system is the despair of the genealogist, who must look over every page, regardless of dates, to be sure he has not overlooked a name he seeks. This custom was followed in other Dutch churches in the eighteenth century. English Neighborhood (now Ridgefield), 1770; no records pror to 1812. Saddle River Reformed (Dutch), at Pascack, about 1784, under one consistory until 1789 with the Paramus Church, and with the same ministry until 1814; no records preserved. Ramapo (Mahwah) Reformed (Dutch), 1785. New Prospect Methodist Episcopal, about 1795; no early records.

THE WICKS FAMILY JOURNEY

Significant Occurances Through the Maze of My Genealogical Research

This letter then became the base for all that was to come and has been accomplished. The letter was also my formal introduction to my great grandfather Thomas Wicks, b. 1839. My first ancestral discovery — our Christian names matched — but that's getting ahead of myself.

The first formidable research collection I was directed to search was the Latter Day Saints (LDS) records. On Feb. 16, 1984 I was able to find a stake (church) in Morristown. There, in the International

Genealogical Index (IGI) I made my first family discovery (connection). Elvy Wicks, m. 1825 Mary Ann Sherwood. There is no way I can tell you how I felt — I was truly in awe; there before me on microfiche was the first record I had found of my family. From that beginning I found that Thomas Wicks, b. 1839 had four brothers and sisters. I also read that Elvy and Mary had another Thomas b. 1837 (it is certain he died young and Thomas b. 1839 was given the name).

The Federal Archives provided much of the family history through a quirk of spelling — or it may have been my great grandmother's Irish accent which led the coroner astray. Thomas Wicks served in the Civil War. When he was discharged he lived in New York City (1865-1868), then Brooklyn, New York. He married twice, raised a family, and suffered a fall at work which led to his death in 1889. My great grandmother, Rosannah Cassidy Smith Wicks filed pension papers to collect his pension as a Civil War veteran. The initial appeal could not be filed because his death certificate was made out for Thomas Weeks, not Wicks. Due to that error, a number of affidavits were required which gave me much additional family data.

In successive years I joined two Genealogical Societies in England, The Norfolk Genealogical Society and the Suffolk Genealogical Society. As my great great grandfather Elvy Wicks was married to Mary Ann Sherwood in Norfolkshire, this seemed natural. My great grandfather Thomas Wicks likewise was born in Bury St. Edmunds, Suffolkshire. Over the years I did get some substantial help from one member, Mrs. Stella Stagg. She did some census research for me on both Elvy and Thomas. What she did find was Robert Wicks, son of Elvy and his family. In her letter of 30 July 1984 she gave me information on Robert and Isabella Wicks from the 1871 census and also looked at the 1841 census from Shipdam, Norfolkshire, where she found a Robert and Charlotte Wicks and their six children. What is interesting is that all the Wicks took up the trade of stone mason, going back to Elvy.

Being alone with my Genealogical Helper did aid in my research. Each issue was read cover to cover and I learned many research techniques from this excellent publication. I took advantage of putting my Wicks line in the "Root Cellar," a listing they keep which consists of family lines being researched by their readers. I would scan this eagerly each issue, hoping to get a lead. However, as time went on, I wanted to meet with other researchers. So I took a Community Education course offered at the Ridgewood Adult School: An Introduction to Genealogy. The course was run by Maria Hopper in the winter of 1983. From that introduction I became an active member in the Genealogical Society of Bergen County (GSBC). This is where the twists in the maze get really interesting.

As part of becoming a new member my name was placed in the Society's quarterly publication, *The Archivist*, at that time edited by Ted Obal. Within a week of my name appearing in *The Archivist* I received a call from Mrs. M. Johnston, a member of the GSBC. After a very interesting discussion, I was convinced that she had documentation which would link her husband's family to my Wicks line. I waited several days for copies

of letters written in 1839 to arrive, and my hunch proved correct. Mrs. Johnston did indeed link me with my great great grandfather's brother, another Thomas Wicks.

Here the maze gets even more difficult. Elvy (Elvi) is mentioned in the letter as well as a child who died 18 months ago (that would be 1837). I have documentation that Elvy and Mary lost a child, Thomas, b. 1837. This makes a total of four Thomas Wicks' if you count me. With the letter there was also a family Bible listing of 45 other Wicks and related family members from 1791 to 1866. My membership in the Society had paid off in dividends beyond my wildest dreams.

The Society (GSBC) has asked that members make up an Ahnentafel Chart and submit it for consideration of publication in future issues of *The Archivist*. I took advantage of the offer. *The Archivist* published the Wicks family chart in 1989. I knew then, from my recent experience, that it's best to get published whenever possible — some day it may ring a bell or connect the family line. As far as I know I have no roots in Bergen County, but if I keep searching that may change.

The genealogists I've met over the past twelve years are always eager to listen to a research problem and give hints on how you can work the next step. I've found this to be most helpful, especially in tracing my great grandmother, Rosannah Cassidy Smith Wicks. Much of the documentation I have on Rosannah came from the Federal Census records of 1870, 1900, and 1910. I found these sources at the Federal Archives (then located in Bayonne, now in New York City). These links have proved to me the most exciting to date. Combining this information with the letter written by Beatrice Wicks Bond, the seeds of the most exciting discovery were sown — but again I'm just a little ahead of myself.

The computer (PC) has been the greatest boon to genealogical research since the advent of pencil and paper. That's a fact that I can attest to and will repeat often. I will work on encouraging others to use computer technology in their research for the following reason: data sent or stored on a computer network is constantly being reviewed and studied all over the network (possibly the world). My personal experience may be proof of the argument. In 1991 I was at the LDS genealogy library in Morristown. One of the librari as asked me if I had submitted my Ancestor File to the Family History Data File. I asked her to tell me about what it entailed. She handed me a form which I had to fill out, send in, and eventually (entry time - typing considered) my Family Group Sheet would appear on their CD ROM which goes to LDS libraries all over the world. So, off went another form and I still had no living ancestors for all my research.

I now entered a new phase of the maze — being discovered. On August 18, 1995 I received a letter from Franklin Jansen of North Bangor, NY. He wrote: "Dear Mr. Wicks — I want to thank you for the favor you did me when you entered data into the LDS Ancestor File. Last month my wife and I took part in an Elderhostel genealogy program at BYU, Provo, Utah. I went there knowing my Grandmother's maiden name was Mary Wicks (I got that off some wedding glasses she had

marked Mary and Alex — the Wicks came from the ID code on one of my father's bank accounts. . . .) and that my great grandfather had married an Irish girl. . . . When I entered the Ancestor File, I found a bonanza. Grandma had a middle name (Francis), brothers, and her mother was no longer just my Irish Great Grandma — she had a name, Rosannah Cassidy, and parents and grandparents — all thanks to you.

....to see if you have any more information on our mutual ancestors — any pictures (I have a few pictures of my grandmother taken in the 1940s, and also Aunt Suzy at that time.... I would also like to know whether or not you have anything more of Elvy Wicks and on the Sherwood family.... Thanks again for giving me a big headstart and I hope to hear from you soon... Sincerely, Franklin G. Jansen.

After reading the letter several times with a critical eye, I went to my own documentation, just to be sure. I had a hard time holding in my excitement. It was an authentic connection. The amazing part of the letter is that I now have a living relative I never knew existed. Franklin Jansen has just started to do genealogical research. He found me when he was out in Provo, Utah doing genealogical research on his newly uncovered Jansen/Wicks connection. He has just started and through the LDS computer has found our link, my grandfather, George Valentine Wicks, b. 1872, is brother to Mary Wicks Jansen, b. 1869, who is his grandmother. I have talked and met with Franklin Jansen several times

There are still many branches of the family to explore. The history is written for my children Kelly, Brian, and Michael, and my grandchildren Emily and Caroline Ray. I have been the fortunate recipient of the many hours of work of many census enumerators, WPA workers, LDS missionaries and librarians, and NYC Public Library Genealogical Room staff. I have received encouragement from my wife Helen Hart Wicks, information from family members, and most of all support of my fellow genealogists from here in Bergen County, NJ (GSBC) to England. My work on the Wicks line is by no means unique, nor have I uncovered any illustrious ancestors (nor skeletons in the closet), but I have been able to reach back in time, identify ancestors, document in some small way their lives, which in turn brings a fuller richness to our family. It has become an important, satisfying adventure and a truly wonderful legacy to pass on to the next generation and the next. Thank you all. — Thomas Wicks, Ridgewood, NJ, 25 August 1995.

GENEALOGICAL ABSTRACTS OF REVOLUTIONARY WAR PENSIONS OF RESIDENTS OF BERGEN COUNTY, NJ

Geographical Note from the Editor: As you read these abstracts, keep in mind that the original area of Bergen Country was quite large. Its area at one time included today's Passaic County (established 7 Feb 1837) and Hudson County (est. 22 Feb 1840). In addition, there were some adjustments

to boundaries even after 1840. For instance, in the 1850 Federal Census, say your family was in *Harrison Township in Hudson County*. In the 1860 Federal Census, without even making a physical move out of the old homestead, the family might be listed in *Union Township in Bergen County*. (in 1852 part of Harrison Township, Hudson County, was added to Bergen County as Union Township.) Even some southern parts of Orange and Rockland Counties in New York State were at one time considered by some to be in New Jersey.

Note: An asterisk (*) or (*Abstracter's note) indicates a note or interpolation by the abstracter of these records.



Vital Records from New Jersey Health Department

According to GSBC member Donna Ristenbatt, the New Jersey Health Department is now taking genealogy requests by mail. The lepartment will only do a one year search for \$4. After the first of he year, that amount may be doubled, if the Legislature passes it. A person may send in *only three* requests at a time. The requests nust be for three *different* people, and each only a one year search. If you want three separate years for the same person, that nust be done in three separate envelopes. To obtain forms for submitting requests, write to: State Registrar - Search Unit, New Jersey State Dept. of Health, CN 370, Trenton, NJ 08625-0370. Be sure to include a SASE.

Lutheran Church in New York and New Jersey

Arnold Lang, GSBC Treasurer, has forwarded the following information on early Bergen County Churches. He writes: "I uncovered the following during my research for the Hackensack Lutheran Church (located in Hackensack Township — now Teaneck). Hackensack Lutheran Church (1704-ca 1776) — "Lutheran Church in NY and NJ 1722-1760" by Simon Hart — Translation of the German Ministerial Records. The original records for the German Lutheran Congregation in NY dating from 1704 (which includes the Hackensack church records) are in the New York Genealogical & Biographical Society library. The LDS made many film copies of these records. Some of the film numbers of original copies are: 1019520, 1019521, 0888793, etc. Film 1293956 contains typed manuscripts of Baptisms 1704-1723 and Marriages 1704 -1772."

Photography, Photographers & Photographic Equipment

L. J. M. Daguerre discovered the first permanent photographic process and presented it to the public in France in August 1839. The product came to be known as a Daguerreotype; the photographers who produced them were called Daguerreians. John S. Craig of Torrington, CT offers for sale many items of interest to collectors of historic and collectible photographs and photographic equipment. He has recently published three volumes of *Craig's Daguerreian Registry*, a series of books identifying, documenting individuals, locating cities and states of their activity, and giving biographical information on thousands of pre-1860 daguerreians and other early pioneers of the photographic industry in the United States. Craig also buys unusual and interesting photographic items, from single pieces to entire collections. He stocks factory instruction manuals

DID YOU KNOW?

In early Dutch records e, i, and y, were pronounced the same and were therefore interchangeable — that is why Antje, can also appear as Antie, or Antye they are all the same name. Also, in church records j.d. and y.d. or jonge dochter (young daughter or spinster) and j.m. and y.d. or jonge man (young man or bachelor), are the same term. This practice is particularly noticeable with men whose fathers' names began with "J" — Jacob, Johannes, John, etc. The Jersey Dutch until late into the 19th century, would traditionally use their father's first name as the middle name or middle initial. Because of the I and J were considered the same letter in the days of the 24 letter printer's alphabet (u and v were, as well), the same man is often found as Peter I. Hopper and Peter J. Hopper, which can lead to confusion. Especially since Peter the son of Issac would always be Peter I. Hopper. To make genealogy even more challenging, in some translations of original records (especially noticable in the translation of the eighteenth century tax records), the I which was usually crossed on a diagonal, is transcribed as a T. So you may find Peter, the son of James Hopper, as Peter J. Hopper, Peter I. Hopper or Peter T. Hopper. - Ree Hopper

Emigrant Industrial S.B. Records at NYC Public Library

The recently discovered ledgers of the Emigrant Industrial Savings Bank containing "incredible detail" on the lives of immigrant Irish arrivals at the Port of New York in the middle of the 19th century. are located in the Rare Books & Manuscript Division of the New York Public Library, on 5th Avenue and 42nd Street. The Emigrant bank was founded in 1850 in southern Manhattan as an offshoot of the Irish Emigrant Society begun in 1841 to help the hundreds of thousands of famine victims pouring into New York City (by 1855, Irish men and women were the largest foreign-born group in New York, comprising 28% of the city's population). Jeanne M. Carley has written an article, "Finding Gems in the NYCPL: Using Records of the Emigrant Industrial Savings Bank of New York" which appeared in the September 1996 issue of the Westchester County [NY] Genealogical Society Newsletter (Vol. 13, No. 1). This newsletter is available in our library. In the article she recounts her experiences at the library and elsewhere as she traced her husband's great-grandfather, the Irish immigrant Michael Edward Carley.

Local and Nearby Genealogical Sources in Libraries

In addition to our own collection housed at the Midland Park, NJ Library, there are some other local and nearby repositories that have genealogical holdings of interest to northern New Jersey researchers.

Here are two that might prove worth a trip:

- ◆ The Johnson Public Library, 274 Main Street, Hackensack, NJ (201-343-4169) houses, in addition to its own collection of local history reference materials (including early Bergen County newspapers on microfilm), the extensive library collection of the Bergen County Historical Society. The Society's collection includes published local histories and genealogies, vertical file collections of manuscript items and other miscellanea, and more. There are also microfilmed original manuscript late-18th-century Bergen County Tax Rateables. The collection is available for public use during hours the library is open.
- ◆ The Rockland Room, at the New City Library, 220 North Main Street, New City, NY (Rockland Co.) (914-634-4997/4962) holds an ever-growing collection of materials of interest to genealogists researching northern New Jersey, Rockland County, and New York City families. The library has a large, off-street parking lot and when we last checked, was open on Sunday afternoons as well as normal weekday and Saturday hours. ■

GENEALOGICAL ABSTRACTS OF REVOLUTIONARY WAR PENSIONS OF RESIDENTS OF BERGEN COUNTY, NJ

Abstracted by Philip O'Leary, III

Geographical Note from the Editor: As you read these abstracts, keep in mind that the original area of Bergen Country was quite large. Its area at one time included today's Passaic County (established 7 Feb 1837) and Hudson County (est. 22 Feb 1840). In addition, there were some adjustments to boundaries even after 1840. For instance, in the 1850 Federal Census, let's say your family was in Harrison Township in Hudson County. In the 1860 Federal Census, without even making a physical move out of the old homestead, the family might be listed in Union Township in Bergen County (in 1852 part of Harrison Township, Hudson County, was added to Bergen County as Union Township). Even some southern parts of Orange and Rockland Counties in New York State were at one time considered by some to be in New Jersey.

Note: An asterisk (*) or (*Abstracter's note) indicates a note or interpolation by the abstracter of these records.

ohn Packer

John Packer of Franklin Twp., Bergen Co., NJ; Pvt., IJ Militia, Revolutionary War Pension No. S3635. Bergen Co., NJ Common Pleas Court, 31 Oct 1821, ohn Packer a resident of Franklin Twp., Bergen Co., IJ; age 71yrs; b. 25 Dec 1760, "in part of Saddle River Twp. now called Franklin Twp., Bergen Co., IJ"; d. late 1840 at Campgaw. Others mentioned in pension, all testifing as fellow soldiers in the Revoution: Thomas Hammond, Samuel Romain, age 74 as of 22 Oct 1832, Albert Wilson, of Franklin Twp., age 78 yrs as of 20 Oct 1832, Peter Tice, of Franklin Twp., age 79 yrs as of 20 Oct 1832, Abraham Garrison, age 71 yrs as of 20 Jul 1833. Ontario Co., NY Common Pleas Court, 27 Aug 1832, Abraham Garrison a resident of Gorham, Ontario Co., NY; age 71 yrs; b. 25 Dec 1760, Franklin Twp., Bergen Co., NJ; enlisted at Pittstown, Rensselaer Co., NY; after discharge in 1780-81, lived at Pittstown for 27 yrs; then moved to Gorham. Others mentioned in pension, all of Gorham and testifing as knowing Abraham Garrison was a soldier in the Revolution: John, Michael and Levi Fransisco.

Abstracter's note: See Revolution War Pension of John Garrison, R3929, b. 30 Mar 1763 at "Paulingskill," NJ; also lived at Pittstown. An Abraham Garrison and John, Michael and Levi Fransisco, testify for him.

Garabrants a resident of Bergen Twp., Bergen Co., NJ, age 76 yrs; b. 13 Jun 1756 at Stove House Plains [Stone House Plains? - Ed.], Sussex Co., NJ; d. 14 Nov 1832, m. 05 Aug 1792 Acquackanock RDC, Elizabeth Messelear. Living at Acquackanock when enlisted in the service, after the war lived at Long Island and Bloomfield, NY. Hudson Co., NJ Common Pleas Court, 21 Jan 1848, Elizabeth Garabrants, age 77 yrs; a resident of Jersey City, widow of Garabrant N. Garabrants.

Others mentioned in pension, all testifing to the war service of Garabrant N. Garabrants: James J.
