The Ridgewood Library is pleased to announce their subscription to a new database called Ancestry-Plus. This subscription was made possible through the support of Helene Rogers, the Genealogical Society of Bergen County and the Ridgewood Public Library. AncestryPlus is powered by ancestry. com. The subscription includes 705 million US names and parts of ancestry.com to which we did not previously subscribe, ie. the US Census images (now complete from 1790-1920) and the UK and Ireland collection. The Water Works Conservancy, Inc. created. In an attempt to save the 19th century water pumping and filtration plant from destruction, your help is needed. This historic Hackensack Water Company site is an intact, state-of-the-art 19th century water treatment and pumping facility. Built in 1882, the plant operated continually from 1882 to 1990. The buildings occupy two acres of the 13.5 acre Van Buskirk Island in Oradell, New Jersey. The site is part of a 65-acre "open space" parcel that was given to Bergen County in 1993 by the Hackensack Water Company. The structures include: the Pump House, with 100 years of intact technology-steam to electricity; the Filtration Plant, with the historic labs where the activated charcoal method of filtration was invented that became the international standard; the Gate House; two stacks and miscellaneous storage and repair sheds. This site is important because

- It is an intact (1882—1914), state-of-the-art 19th century water pumping and filtration plant;
- It contains a timeline of 100 years of technology.
- The method of activated carbon water filtration was discovered on this site and became an international standard
- The plant marks the historic beginning in this nation of a supply of safe, potable water.

- An Official Project of Save America's Treasures
- Listed on the National Register of Historic Places
- Listed on the New Jersey Register of Historic Places
- National Landmark eligible (nomination pending)
- ASME Landmark eligible (nomination pending)

The National Institute of Genealogical Research (NIGR) will be holding its annual study program July 15-20, 2002. NIGR focuses on Federal records of genealogical value. In addition to sessions on the census, records for African American, land, military and cartographic research, the 2002 program will feature the soon-to-be released 1930 Federal population census, records of World War I, Americans abroad, and passports. Popular sessions about naturalizations, citizenship, and immigration documents will also be included along with a visit to Archives II in College Park, MD. The program is held in the National Archives. Evening sessions at the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution Library and the Local History and Genealogy Room of the Library of Congress are optional. Enrollment is limited to 44 and fills very quickly. Brochures are mailed in early February. - To avoid confusion, limit queries to one or two requests about the same individual or family. If you need information about more than one individual or family, write separate additional queries.
- Use common, clear abbreviations. If you're not sure of an abbreviation, use the complete word or term to avoid misunderstanding.
- Use CAPITAL letters for SURNAMES ONLY
- Please include contact information for answers. When space permits and the Editor is advised, the answers to queries will be reprinted in the Archivist.
- All queries will be kept on file for a limited time in the Local History Room of the Ridgewood Public Library in the vertical file of the GSBC.

Q2002-001 - I am seeking information on Elias Boudinot Conover, born in NJ in 1817 or 1818 and family records say he died in Englewood-under-the-Cliffs on August 12, 1888. Have not found death certificate but he is buried at Ever-

green Cemetery, Brooklyn, whose records say he died in East Englewood. Trying to determine if he was of one of the three Conover families living in Saddle River at the time of the 1830 census. The families of Henry Conover and of Nancy Conover both had male children in his age range. He was in NYC in the 1840, 1850, 1860 and 1870 census and was in Englewood for the 1880 census. On April 4, 1836, he married Catherine Sinclair (Cinclair or St. Clair) at the Greene Street Church in Manhattan. Different census have listed him as Mulatto, Black and White. ## The Diaries of Elizabeth Ann (Lizzie) Campbell

Elizabeth Ann (Lizzie) Campbell, was the daughter of John A. Campbell and Hannah Demarest. She was b. 14 Sep 1849 (from diary "14 Sep 1868 today is my nineteenth birthday), in Park Ridge. She was bap. as Elizabeth Ann, daughter of John and Hannah Campbell, at Parcack Reformed Dutch Church. [Church Records give only one date, that of 4 Sep 1849].

She d. 29 Jan 1931, unmarried at her home on Main Street in Park Ridge, and is buried with her parents in the Pascack Reformed Cemetery. She never married. Her obituary said her death "closed the career of the last surviving person to be engaged in wampum making. Her father and his three brothers, and their firm the Campbell Brothers made wampum in a mill at Park Ridge using a drilling machine invented by her Uncle James. The process was a closely guarded family secret. The only existing wampum drilling machine is on exhibit at the Pascack Historical Society in Park Ridge, NJ. The obituary also stated, "Miss Campbell who was 81 years old, one of the oldest residents of Park Ridge, had long been without the use of her lower limbs, but had a happy disposition.

## The Lady in the Painting by Barbara Johansson

I inherited an oil painting from my parents. It was originally purchased by my father and hung in his Manhattan restaurant (The Press Box) for years. He used to buy various paintings to use for decorating from an old gallery on Third Avenue, back in the days when the "el" overhead shaded the antique shops below. One day when dusting the back of the canvas (a rare occurrence), I realized there was writing on it and a crown symbol. It said "Mrs. Wildman of Chilham Castle Kent, eldest daughter of Stephen Rumbold Lushington of Norton Court Kent".

Several years later, my husband and I were planning an auto tour of England and I discovered there is a tiny hamlet called Chilham, a few mile southeast of Canterbury. We made it a point to visit. We found the castle and manor house enveloped in an impenetrable wall, with an absentee Greek owner who no longer allowed the public to tour the gardens as had once been possible.

We walked the village, more charming than any we had found in the Cotsworld's. The church, built in the 1300's was open. In it we found a monument to one member of the Wildman family. I wrote to the head of their historical society, telling about my painting. The dates (1850-60) that family owned the castle matched the style of the garment in the pictures. We made photos of the painting and canvas backing, and sent them to the Chilham Historical Society. They frequently get visits from members of the family and plan to give them a copy of the photo.



So someone in merry England will be able to have a look at a long lost relative, and I have the pleasure of knowing that I helped another in a genealogical quest.

#### 1930 Census Part I by Arnie Lang

#### The 1930 Census

#### What Information is Available/How to Find Your Ancestors

Finally, on April 1, 2002, after 72 years, the 1930 census microfilms and all existing soundex indexes became available at the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) in Washington, DC and at the Regional Facilities. This census was not previously available for general public use because in 1952, when the government decided to release such census details, life expectancy was about 72 years. Officials had figured that sealing the information that long would largely preserve privacy rights.

These census schedules should start to become available elsewhere (e.g., the LDS Family History Centers, Heritage Quest, etc.) at about the time this issue of *The Archivist* goes to press. GSBC members will be able to access these records on-line at the Ridgewood Public Library using AncestryPlus. Images for the state of Delaware, D.C., Utah and Vermont were the first digitized images available through AncestryPlus. Additional states are being posted each week until all images are online. They estimate that all 2,667 rolls of microfilm will be digitized and published online by early July.

Information in the 1930 census can be extremely valuable in your genealogical research. In addition to including names, ages, addresses, birthplaces and occupations about each family member, items such as the date of immigration and whether naturalized are valuable in finding passenger lists and naturalization information. The 1930 census even asked if the household had a radio. This article describes what information you can find on these census schedules and provides procedures and hints for finding your ancestors' records.

# The 1930 census asked 32 questions about each person:

#### Place of Abode

- 1. Street, avenue, road, etc.
- 2. House number (in cities or towns)
- 3. Number supplied by census taker of dwelling
- 4. Number supplied by census taker of family

#### Name & Relation

- Name of each person whose place of abode on April 1, 1930, was in this family.
- Relationship of this person to the head of the family.

#### **Home Data**

- 7. Home owned or rented.
- 8. Value of home, if owned, or monthly rental, if rented.
- 9. Have radio set?
- 10. Does this family live on a farm?

#### **Personal Description**

- 11.Sex.

## 1930 Census Part I (cont'd)

## How to Find your Ancestor in the 1930 Census!

General Search Approach

You need to use different procedures to search for your ancestors, dependent upon which state and/or city you are looking. The general search procedure should be:

Check to determine if a soundex index is available for your state. If so, get the appropriate soundex index microfilm and search for your ancestor.

If the state has no soundex index, and if you know the street address of your ancestor in 1930, check the **street address index** list below to see if the city is one of the 50 that are indexed. If so, get the appropriate roll of M1931 microfilm series and find the ED listing for that street address.

Lacking either of the above, perform a geographic search as described later

NOTE: If you have computer on-line access, your search can be expedited by using Stephen Morse's web page; "Obtaining EDs for the 1930 Census in One Step" as described later. After you enter the state, county and/or city at that web site, you are immediately told if a soundex index exists or you are given the roll number of the street address index if one exists for your location. However, this website is most useful for regions where neither of those indexes exist. For 100 major cities that have neither a soundex nor an address index, it presents an interactive interface that allows you to easily "compute" the ED after entering the street information.

#### Soundex Indexes

Soundex indexes exist for only the following southern states:

Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky (part), Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, and West Virginia (part).

#### Street Address Indexes

Street address indexes for the 1930 census have been made for 50 larger cities listed in the following table. If your city is listed here, get the appropriate roll of microfilm series M1931, Index to Selected City Streets and Enumeration Districts, 1930 Census (7 rolls). Search for your city and street address and the enumeration district number will be shown.

In addition to the above cities, address indexes exist for most of North Carolina.

#### Geographic (ED) Search

Eventually, AncestryPlus and others will probably prepare name indexes for all states. However, in the interim, you must resort to a "geographic search" where the indexes are not available. Here you will use city directories, your family history, old envelopes with addresses, receipts, etc., to find an address for your ancestor in 1930. Then, based on that "known" address, you must find the appropriate Enumeration District (ED). Once you know the ED number, go to the National Archives Catalog and locate the correct microfilm number containing that ED. Finally, do a page by page search of that ED to find the address in that microfilm.

Geographic Search Finding Aids - The NARA and others are providing aids to find an Enumeration District number in the 1930 census. These include: City Directories, Geographic descriptions of census enumeration districts (on microfilm and on-line), Enumeration District Maps for 1930 Census, On-Line Enumeration District Search Engines ("Obtaining EDs for the 1930 Census in One Step")

<u>City Directories</u> - City directories exist for many areas and provide street addresses that may then be used to find the ED. NARA has obtained hundreds of circa 1930 City Directories which are available at all of their branch offices. For Example, the directories available for the Bergen and Passaic Counties of New Jersey include:

Hackensack - 1928 - 1931

Includes Bogota, Maywood, Teaneck

Harrison/Kearny - 1928-1929

Includes East Newark, Arlington, North Arlington

Passaic - 1929-1930

Includes Clifton, Garfield, Wallington

Paterson - 1928-1931

Includes Haledon, Hawthorne, Prospect Park, Little Falls, Totowa Borough, West Paterson

Geographic Descriptions of Census Enumeration Districts - An Enumeration District (ED) was an area that could be covered by a single enumerator (census taker) in one census period which was 2-4 weeks for the 1930 Census. EDs varied in size from several city blocks in densely populated urban areas to an entire county in sparsely populated rural areas

The ED descriptions are available on NARA Microfilm Publication Number T1224 - "Descriptions of Census Enumeration Districts, 1830-1950 (156 rolls)." The descriptions of enumeration districts for the 1930 census are arranged by state, then by county, on rolls 61 through 90 in T1224. Microfilm roll 76 includes the ED descriptions for New Jersey.

The ED descriptions are also on-line on the NARA website at: http://1930census.archives.gov/beginSearch.asp It might be somewhat easier to find the ED using the NARA web site rather than the T1224 rolls. But in either case, the task can be non-trivial for larger cities which have many enumeration districts.

Enumeration District Maps for the 1930 Census - These maps are on NARA microfilm publication M1930 - "Enumeration District Maps for the Fifteenth Census of the United States, 1930." There are 30 rolls of microfilm that include 8,345 enumeration district map sheets. The maps are arranged alphabetically: First by state, then by county, and then by minor civil division if used. A list of the maps is included on roll number 1. Also, the relevant part of the list of maps is included at the beginning of each roll. Roll 23 includes the maps for New Jersey. These maps may be more useful than the ED descriptions, especially where the descriptions include obsolete street names, or use ward numbers and/or election district numbers to describe the ED.

#### Obtaining EDs for the 1930 Census in One Step (Large Cities)

Stephen Morse's website at: http://home.pacbell.net/spmorse/census/

This one-step web site is a great aid in helping to simplify the search process to find the ED for larger cities. After you go to that web site and you enter the state (and perhaps the county), you will be informed immediately if a **soundex index** exists. If one does not exist, you proceed to specify the city. At this point the website will tell you if your city is **address indexed** on the M1931 microfilm series and, if so, it will give you the roll number. You can then go to that roll of microfilm to find the ED from the known address. You should note that some cities, such as Manhattan, are indexed in both the M1931 microfilm.

If your address does not fall into either of the above categories, this website will make it easy for you to determine the ED for about 100 selected large cities. You simply enter your street name and the website will tell you which EDs that street passes through. If it is contained in only one ED, your task of finding the ED is finished. Otherwise you can enter additional nearby (cross) streets and the website will list the EDs common to those streets. By entering enough additional streets, the website is generally able to narrow the possibilities down to only a single ED.

A great feature of this site is the ability to find cross streets that are near the address that you are looking for! A quick way to do this is after you have selected your street, type in a house number, and then click the "MapIt" button. This will send a command to another website (MapQuest) to display a present-day map of the area that includes the address. If the street names and house numbers have not changed since 1930, then the cross streets will show up on the map. You can then quickly enter the names of the cross streets that you find. (HINT: Use the magnify function on the map to display the names of streets if the original scale is too small to display all street names.)

At present, about 100 larger cities have been indexed on this site. Others are added as volunteers enter the data for additional cities. The cities in New Jersey that are now available on this web site are: Bayonne, Camden, Jersey City, and Trenton (This is in addition to Elizabeth, Newark and Paterson which are address indexed on the M1931 microfilm series.)

#### Searching in Bergen County

You may have noted that there are no soundex indexes, no address indexes, nor any "large cities" included on the Stephen Morse web site for any Bergen County community. You therefore must perform the geographic search process to search the 1930 census in Bergen County.

Bergen County had 261 Enumeration Districts in the 1930 census and the census schedules are included on 8 rolls of microfilm. To find which roll of microfilm is needed, first use the ED descriptions on the T1224 microfilm series (or preferably on the NARA web site as described above) to find the ED for the desired community.

Luckily, many Bergen County communities have only one ED. If your community is one of those, you can get the microfilm for that ED and then look for your address. However, some cities have numerous EDs. (For example Hackensack has 18 Enumeration Districts). In these cases, the ED description describes the streets, etc., that form the boundaries of the ED. You can use a map to locate your street and then you should outline each ED on the map in the area where your street is located. You can then determine the ED (or possibly more than one ED) number for your street.

One Final thought. On the 1930 census, there were three Bergen County municipalities that had names that were different than the present day names. They are: 1930 - East Paterson is now Elmwood Park, 1930 - Lodi Township is now South Hackensack, and 1930 - Riverside is now River Edge. Good Luck in your Search!

# The Diaries of Elizabeth Ann (Lizzie) Campbell

Elizabeth Ann (Lizzie) Campbell, was the daughter of John A. Campbell and Hannah Demarest. She was b. 14 Sep 1849 (from diary "14 Sep 1868 today is my nineteenth birthday), in Park Ridge. She was bap. As Elizabeth Ann, daughter of John and Hannah Campbell, at Pascack Reformed Dutch Church. [Church Records give only one date that of 4 Sep 1849].

She d. 29 Jan 1931, unmarried, at her home on Main Street in Park Ridge, and is buried with her parents in the Pascack Reformed Cemetery. She never married. Her obituary said her death "closed the career of the last surviving person to be engaged in wampum making." Her father and his three brothers, and their firm the Campbell Brothers made wampum in a mill at Park Ridge using a drilling machine invented by her Uncle James. The process was a closely guarded family secret. The only existing wampum drilling machine is on exhibit at the Pascack Historical Society in Park Ridge, NJ. The obituary also stated, "Miss Campbell who was 81 years old, one of the oldest residents of Park Ridge, had long been without the use of her lower limbs, but had a happy disposition.

# **Society Meetings**

## Bonnie Brae 2002 by David ASMAN, Head of the House of ASMAN

On Saturday, June 1, 2002, the annual "Bonnie Brae" Scottish Festival and Highland Games took place at Liberty Corners, NJ.

For the second time I had the pleasure of holding the "House of ASMAN" tent. This year 27 Clan and Associations were in attendance. These included ANDERSON, ASMAN, BUCHANAN, CAMERON, CARMICHAEL, COLQUOUN, CURRIE, DONALD, DOUGLAS, FORBES, GALBRAITH, GRAHAM, GUTHRIE, HEN-DERSON, LAMONT, LESLIE, LINDSAY, MACALIS-TAIR, MACDOUGAL, MACKAY, MACMILLIAN, MACNEIL, MACPHERSON, and ROSS. ASMAN us a 'House' because the Coat of Arms was granted by the English Authority. Other Associations in attendance were: The Plainfield Curling Club, the NY Caledonian Club, the St. Andrews Society of NY, West Jersey Scottish American Society, NJ Royal Scottish County Dancers, the Black Watch, Marklands and the Companions of the Cross, the Garden State Golden Retrievers, Shetland Sheepdog Club, Charels Edward's Deerhounds, Thera Pet and Golden Retriever Rescue, Inc. Of course there were many vendors selling British wares. Not forgetting the food vendors offering meat pies, bridies, sausage rolls and more.

On Friday evening, violent thunder storms raged through NJ and thoughts of last years soggy field came to mind. However, the rain stopped in the early hours of Saturday morning and brought drying winds. I arrived at 8 a.m. and was pleased to be told that I could take my car onto the field and park near my tent space. The day turned out to be one of the best. Sunshine all day with a cool breeze to keep the temperature at a bearable level. The 'games' and other activities went on ok in a pleasing manner making it a perfect day.

The 'House of ASMAN' tent was again successful in arousing quite an interest in people other than ASMANS. Although I was a little disappointed that the NJ ASMAN households who had been sent a personal invitation, did not show up. Last year I put the absence due to the bad weather, not the case this year.

Those that came to the tent, again as last year, were curious about the name and asked about the difference between 'House' and 'Clan'. This was explained by the fact that an Armigerous Family is called a 'clan' in Scotland and a similar family is called a 'house' in England. The first ASMAN to be granted an official coat of arms was residing in England at the time of the grant which was by the College of Arms, London. Two families who had a British descent, but had no Scottish connection as far as they knew, wanted to be able to join a similar association. Most or all of the Clans like to have their members be of the name, or married to, or descended from, someone of the name. However, most have a clause that says 'an affinity with society'. That applies with the House of ASMAN, too. Another interest was from a person who had a German ancestry and wondered if he could fit in somewhere. I told him of the ASMAN connection with the town in Germany called 'Assmannshousen-Am-Rhine' where the best 'spatburgunder' (red wine) is made

This year I added two full-sized copies of my 'Letters Patent', a) 1978 granting my coat of arms, original badge, crest and motto; and b) 1989 granting the new badge, to my display of shields, **ASMAN** tartan and flyers.

My friend, Danny CIARIELLO, was not able to attend this year with his sons and their friends. The four boys usually attend dressed in boy scout fashion and wearing ASMAN tartan scouters (tri-corner neck scarves). Without their valued support I had to march in the Tartan Parade as the 'lone man' again.

Four members of the two local genealogical society's that I belong to, assisted my wife, Gail, at the tent and have my many thanks.

Anyone who becomes a member (no fee) gets assistance in tracing their personal family tree and is provided with preprinted family group sheets and descendant charts as the line is developed. To start all is required is name, address and fill out a family group sheet. Sheets provided on request.

For those who are interested, Art Pewter Silver of Scotland have agreed to supply me with **ASMAN** Crest Badges, Kilt Pins, Cuff Links, Sgian Dubh (the small knife carried in the right leg hose) etc. Prices on request.

Another useful contact is with a Scottish woolen firm who have agreed to weave the **ASMAN** family tartan. The longer the woven bold of cloth, the lower the price. 60 yards is the longest bolt. There is usually 8 yds. in a man's kilt and 3 yds. In a ladies kilt skirt. So if five men and five ladies would each have a kilt or kilt skirt made it would be worth having the bolt made. Anyone interested let me know and I will look into it and get more details of what is required in measurements and pricing.

Remember, you do not have to be Scottish to bring 'Forritt the Tartan'. We have our own tartan why not flaunt it? You can attend any of the Highland, Scottish, Celtic Festivals and wear the ASMAN tartan with pride. The late Jack DALGETTY, who helped to develop the ASMAN tartan, described the ASMAN family tartans as 'one of the most distinguished of tartans'. To the credit of the designed Dr. Philip D. SMITH, author of "Tartan for Me" and co-author of the three volume "Tartans".

The next Highland event that the 'House of ASMAN' tent will be in attendance is the Long Island Scottish Games to be held on Sat., August 24th 9 a.m.— 5 p.m. The games will be held at Old Westbury Gardens on Long Island. ## **New Jersey News**

Reprinted from FGS Forum Magazine, Spring, 2002; Pg 25

The Customer Services Unit of the New Jersey Department of Health and Senior Services in Trenton has a response letter which says, in part, "There will no longer be year before and year after searches. The Search Unit Staff will search the requested year and the requested year \*only\* in response to a customer requests." The policy is stated thus: The Bureau of Vital Statistics will no longer accept a request to search or certify a birth. marriage or death record within our files unless the person who is making the request is able to provide the following information: a) The \*exact\* name that is currently recorded on the birth, marriage, or death record (first middle last); b) The \*exact\* place of birth, marriage or death (city); c) The \*exact\* date of birth, marriage or death (month day year); d) the mother's maiden name; e) the father's name (when recorded) .: The letter ends with "\*\*There is no exception to this rule.\*\*" [Gary Mokotoff received the information from Ada Greenblatt in January 2002]. Thank you, Marion Armstrong for the information. You may want to write your legislators and keep public records public and accessible.

#### The Diaries of Elizabeth Ann (Lizzie) Campbell

Elizabeth Ann (Lizzie) Campbell, was the daughter of John A. Campbell and Hannah Demarest. She was b. 14 Sep 1849 (from diary "14 Sep 1868 today is my nineteenth birthday), in Park Ridge. She was bap. as Elizabeth Ann, daughter of John and Hannah Campbell, at Pascack Reformed Dutch Church. [Church Records give only one date, that of 4 Sep 1849].

She d. 29 Jan 1931, unmarried, at her home on Main Street in Park Ridge, and is buried with her parents in the Pascack Reformed Cemetery. She never married. Her obituary said her death "closed the career of the last surviving person to be engaged in wampum making." Her father and his three brothers, and their firm the Campbell Brothers made wampum in a mill at Park Ridge using a drilling machine invented by her Uncle James. The process was a closely guarded family secret. The only existing wampum drilling machine is on exhibit at the Pascack Historical Society in Park Ridge, NJ. The obituary also stated, "Miss Campbell who was 81 years old, one of the oldest residents of Park Ridge, had long been without the use of her lower limbs, but had a happy disposition.

#### NARA's Web Site Gets New Look

Reprinted from PROLOGUE, Summer 2002, Vol. 34, No.2 Page 160

"This summer brings a new user-friendly look to NARA's [National Archives and Records Administration] web site as well as the launch of the new online Archival Research Catalog (ARC).

The newly designed web site will have a new address: <www.archives.gov>. It will also have several new features, such as a drop-down feature on every page called "Where Is? How Do I?" that will help users get to the page they need as quickly as possible.

The redesigned site will also have an alphabetical index, a Frequently Asked Questions feature, and easier viewing of online exhibits. The site will have the same main features it has always had but now will have uniformity and improved navigation. For more details, see the "Spotlight on NARA" feature in the Winter 2001 PROLOGUE.

Also new will be ARC, which is NARA's online catalog describing archival materials nationwide. It replaces the NARA Archival Information Locator (NAIL), which has been the prototype system on the NARA web site. Through ARC, a researcher can use a computer to search for descriptions of documents in NARA facilities nationwide.

Just as NAIL has done, ARC will provide users with descriptions, and sometimes digital images, of hundreds of thousands of records in NARA holdings nationwide. ARC will also bring new standardized descriptions for NARA's holdings as new information about records is entered into the database in the months and years to come.

NARA's strategic plan calls for providing descriptions of 95 percent of the agency's holdings at the series or collection level in ARC by 2007."

For those of you not familiar with PRO-LOGUE, it is the quarterly magazine published by the National Archives and Records Administration. Each quarter the NARA selects specific record collections to highlight. Each article has a bibliography and is well documented for further research. If you have not reviewed this publication, I would strongly suggest you do. These magazines are a wealth of information.

## The NYT @ RPL by Ken Franz

For researching the *New York Times* (NYT), the Ridgewood Public Library (RPL) has a marvelous tool—actually five tools:

Microfilm readers and printer The NYT on microfilm The NYT Index The Personal Name Index An Obit Index

Using these tools together provide a readily accessible and comprehensive source for research in New York City, the metro area and beyond over the past century and a half

There are two microfilm readers with a common printer located along the south wall of the reference room. The lens system provides full page images for scanning at he pages rapidly and enlarged images for reading and printing.

If you need help, ask the reference librarian or one of our Society's volunteer genealogists. For your printouts, please pay at the reference desk, currently \$0.25 per print.

The NYT microfilms are hosed in seven cabinets along the west wall of the reference room. These rolls fo film contain the images of each page from September 1851 to almost the present. The cabinets, each box and roll of film are identified with the from—to dates. Please use one box of film at a time to minimize misfiling. And then return box of film to the top of the cabinets. DO NOT re-file boxes.

The books with the NYT index, the personal name index and the obit index are shelved on the reference room stacks at the library ... Call no. 070. Each listing is these books generally gives the newspaper date, section, page, and column number.

The 131 volumes of the *New York Times Index* have call no. REF//070//Ne. The arrangement of each volume has evolved over the years. Check the first pages of each volume for the chronological and subject arrangement.

The *Personal Name Index* is two sets of volumes with an all inclusive listing of names of people. Each volume is arranged alphabetically, first by surname, then given name and date.

Twenty two volumes, 1851-1974, Call No. 070//P467//x Seven Volumes,

1975-1996, Call No. REF//070//Per.

The New York Times Obituary Index has two volumes.

Volume I,

1858-1968, Call No. REF//070//New Volume II,

1969-1978, Call No. R070//Ne
Each volume is arranged alphabetically, first by surname, then given name and date. Volume II has two sections;

a) Obits of 50 prominent people and b) everybody else.

These three types of indexes provide ready and \*\*aried ways to access the specific pages that you might be interested in, bye they for people or history near or far.

#### **Old Man's Draft**

In April 1942, all men — citizens and aliens—born between 1877-1897 were required to register for the draft. The original 4" x 6" cards for all twenty-one New Jersey counties, all five New York City boroughs and Puerto Rico are available at the Federal Archives on Varick St. in New York. And they're easy to find. The Archives has a special notebook broken down by county/borough so you'll need to know where the person you're looking for lived at the time. Just determine which box contains the registrant's last name and fill out the form.

The front of the cards provide basic information, including employer. The back has descriptive information such as height, weight, etc. They don't provide mother's maiden name, but will give you place of birth. Each registrant filled out his own card. If you're looking for a common name, make sure you know his address, phone number or his wife's name so you can pick out the right card. The draft's purpose was to document men's skills for possible use later in the war. A three-page questionnaire was sent to each person to provide such information. Unfortunately, the questionnaires did not survive.

## **New York City Real Estate Photos**

From 1939 to 1941, the City of New York took pictures of every building in all of the five boroughs. These photos are available on microfilm at the NYC Municipal Archives on Chambers St. (behind City Hall). You need to know the "block" and "lot" numbers in order to locate the building. These can be found by using their maps (located in big heavy books). I recommend bringing a map of the area so you know exactly where your building is located. There are books containing the maps for different parts of the city. So to find the book that has your area, first find the map of the city divided up by boroughs. (This is also in one of the books). The front of "your" book will list all the addresses in the area, and it will give you a "plate" (map) number. Turn to the page with your

"plate" and by using your map of the area, find the building's exact location. That is where you'll find the block and plot numbers. You then have to go to the index by the microfilm readers. The index is on microfilm, but I learned afterwards that they have a book index which I suppose is easier/faster. Using the block and plot numbers, the index will give you a code (a letter followed by a number). Using this code, find that particular borough's microfilm. Scroll the film to your block number. Each photograph has the block and plot on it.

The process isn't as complicated as it sounds so it shouldn't take that long to find your building. Copies from the film reader cost \$.50 but they weren't that good. I copied four buildings: one was decent, two were on the dark side and the other was awful. I was told that the B&W prints would be better but they cost \$25.00 each. The Municipal Archives also has older vital records on microfilm, and upstairs they have original wills/probate records. For more information on the real estate photos and the Municipal Archives, check their web site:

- All queries will be kept on file for a limited time in the Local History Room of the Ridgewood Public Library in the vertical file of the GSBC.

Q2002-012— Susan WATTS, <boswat@lexcomic.net> writes: Parents of John SANDFORD born abt 1758. I need to learn the parents of my ancestor, John SANDFORD, sometimes spelled SANFORD on records. I have his pension information from the National Archives from the Revolutionary War. They show Private John SANDFORD served in the Rev. War from March 6, 1776 to June 11, 1783. Also

John SANDFORD and Catharine DEBOW, daughter of John DEBOW were married the 6th day of November 1783 by the Rev. Wm. DODD at Newark Mountain. History of the City of Paterson and the County of Passaic, NJ by William NELSON 1901 has some about the family of William SANDFORD from Barbados. It says he had a son, William SANDFORD II, who had a son, "Michael SANDFORD who married Maritie DEY and had a son, Johannes SANDFORD baptized May 13, 1733". The book says this Johannes SANDFORD might be "the John SANDFORD who served as a private in the Revolutionary War, afterwards volunteered in the War of 1812, and who lived at Bloomingdale, Passaic County, and was the father of Peregrine SANDFORD of Paterson, for forty years Justice of the Peace, Common Pleas Judge, etc." That was my ancestor, John SANDFORD he was describing, but the birth date of Michael's son, Johannes SAND-FORD is too early to have been John SANDFORD, the Revolutionary War private of Bloomingdale. He is buried in the Pompton Plains Dutch Reformed Church Cemetery. The interment list says; "#302—John SANDFORD born Sept. 1, 1758 died Feb. 15, 1851 served Rev. 7 yrs. 5 mo. 18 day. 11812 3M Volunteer". Johannes, the son of Michael SANDFORD, could have been his father. The third child of William SANDFORD II, John SANDFORD who first married Maritje VAN INBURGH, remarried to Margretie VANDER POEL and had a son Johannes SAND-FORD born, 10 Dec 1732 baptized, 4 Feb 1733 in the Second River Reformed Church. He could be the father of John SANDFORD, the Revolutionary war private of Bloomingdale. John's wife, Catharine DEBOW, is buried in Pompton Plains Dutch Reformed Cemetery. She died Feb 22, 1852 at age 85. I have pictures of the graves. They had 10 children and I have the information about those children and their families. If anyone knows of a church or Bible record showing the parents of John SANDFORD, the Revolutionary War private of Bloomingdale, please contact me via e-mail above. Mrs. Susan A.
